ANNUAL D.C.D. HIGHWAY CONVENTION A SUCCESS

First of all, let it be said Hobart made the maximum of preparations for the entertainment of the convention. The attendance was the largest in the history of the association and the interest was fine. Heavy rains and washouts on several lines entering Hobart kept many delegations from reaching Hobart. Among these were Dallas, Gainesville, Waurika, Lawton and El Reno.

The association voted unanimously in favor keeping up the work of the central organization through the secretary-manager and voted to raise more than \$10,000 on the system for the new year beginning August 1st, 1920. The convention warmly commended the work of the general officers.

The president of the association was authorized to name a committee of five to select permanent markers for the highway and have the same erected along the entire line from Galveston to Denver during the present year.

Governor Robertson made a sensible good roads speech Tuesday night which was endorsed by a rising vote of the large audience. State Senator Thomas of Medicine Park, made the leading address on Tuesday morning. Governor Shoup of Colorado, and Governor Hobbs of Texas, sent telegrams of greetings and offered full co-operation to make the D-C-D Highway all that it is planned for it.

Four state divisions were created as follows: Texas, Colorado, Oklahoma and the Tri-State division, the last of which will include the territory from Elkhart, Kansas, to Childress, Texas.

The general association will hold its next meeting at Elk City, Okla., and the state divisions will decide their meeting place later. For the Oklahoma Division, the following officers were elected: President, E. G. Warren, Lawton; Vice President, G. P. Selvidge, Ardmore; Secretary, H. D. Mahaffey, Elk City.

Among the principles adopted were the following: No part of the highway will be considered first-class unless it is regularly dragged and on which round corners have not been established.—Good Roads Bulletin.

ARDMORE TO ENTERTAIN AT 1921 CONVENTION

BESAW RUBBER TIRE COMPANY SHUTDOWN

The Besaw rubber tire factory shut down at noon Saturday, and will not be operated again until such time as the affairs of the company are fortified with sufficient backing to insure its continuous operation.

Charles Von Weise, one of the principal officers of the concern, stated in an interview, that the plant had been shut down because there was a lack of proper interest shown in the enterprise by many Ardmore citizens who were supposed to be counted upon in the event of a crisis, and enterprise by many Ardmore citizens until the spirit was manifested the plant would remain closed.

For some time it has been known that affairs at the plant were not running as smoothly as they should, that the burden was getting heavier for those who were carrying the load until it became too heavy to bear, therefore the step was taken in order to see if some relief could not be secured.

Mr. Von Weise stated that some of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce said they would get busy Monday and see what could be done toward reopening the plant at once.

The company has approximately \$75,000 worth of raw material on hand, as well as finished tires approximating \$60,000 to build.

The plant is practically new, and is fitted with the very latest machinery for the manufacture of high grade rubber tires, there is little doubt in the minds of many who knew of the condition of affairs but what the factory will be opened again within a very few days.


