When he was little more than a boy, in his first pants, he said to me, 'I'm going to play baseball with Cobb some day,' and now, sure enough, he has realized his ambition."

"Lil" is named after Ulysses S. Grant and it is from the Ulysses that his nick name "Lil" comes.

HORNSBY MAY TIE BABE'S RECORD

Roger Has Been on Hitting Spree of Late and Has Increased Average; Two Follow Close.

ST. LOUIS.—Although his total of 24 home runs gave him the major league circuit hitting championship so far this season, 27 right behind the record of Babe Ruth, the great king, had piled up at this time last year, it still is possible for Rogers Hornsby, star second baseman for the St. Louis Cardinals by a herculean feat to tie the Bambino's record breaking total of 59 homers made in 1921. It was said Saturday.

Hornsby has been on a long distance batting spree and in the last two weeks has connected with seven four base hits, averaging one every day. If he should maintain this average "Horn" would reach Ruth's gigantic total as he has 79 games remaining to be played this year in which he can try to add 35 more home runs.

Kenneth Williams of the St. Louis Browns and Clarence Walker of the Philadelphia Americans are runners-up to Hornsby with 21 circuit smashes each.

BANK GETS JUDGMENT AGAINST LOCAL MAN
