Hayes, of Pittsburgh, is on a land hunt between this city and Jamestown. J. H. Deaking, of Terre Haute, is spending a few weeks in this vicinity viewing the country. Chas. Collins, editor of the *Daily Champion*, claims the Sturgis City townsite as a homestead. The Hon. Ausley Gray (of the Territorial House of Representatives), has been ill for a few days past. S. A. Harrison, one of the "solid men" of Milwaukee, is "roughing it" for a short time over the river. Mr. A. H. Myers and lady returned home yesterday, after a month's absence visiting friends in the East. Smith, the enterprising cattle dealer, is erecting a fine residence on First street, a pleasant addition to the city. D. Macnider, a nephew of R. Macnider, has opened a harness shop on Fourth street in the Wood's Variety building. G. W. Norris, of Boston, and R. D. Caralies, of Marquette, O., were here yesterday on their way to look for gold in the Hills. W. W. Bushnell, of the firm of Thurston & Bushnell, extensive manufacturing agents of St. Paul, is in the city on business. S. Solleck, of Stillwater, who runs an extensive merchant tailoring establishment in this city, is in town looking after his interests. Capt. Braithwaite, the efficient manager of the Bismarck Ways, having completed his job, will leave for his home, St. Louis, this week. Capt. John W. Smith has fixed up winter quarters on lower Main street, which is an indication of his intention to make this city his home. W. B. 
