SEALED PROPOSALS, in triplicate, subject to the usual conditions and requirements, will be received at this office until 12 o'clock noon on the 10th day of February, 1879 at which time and place they will be opened in the presence of bidders, etc., on the following routes in the Department of Dakota, during the year commencing April 1st, 1879, and ending March 31st, 1880.

1—WAGON TRANSPORTATION from and to stations in the State of Minnesota and Territory of Dakota, subject to the conditions contained in form of contract for that service, adopted December 17th, 1878.

2—ROUTE IN MONTANA, Wagon Transportation from and to stations in the Territory of Montana, etc., in accordance with conditions contained in form of contract for that service, adopted December 17th, 1878.

3—YELLOWSTONE RIVERS, between Yankton, D. T., and Fort Benton, M. T., and posts or stations on the Missouri river, between said places, from the 30th of March to the 31st of October, 1879; and from Yankton and Bismarck, D. T. through to Fort Keogh and Big Horn depot, M.
