COL. DONAN, of the Deadwood Pioneer is turning his attention to Heaven, and his issue of the 7th inst. contains a short sentimental sermon on this noted writer's future "paradise lost." The Colonel has written much about "Deadwood, the city of gold," which together with his lectures on "Women" has no doubt been the cause of this sentimental turn of mind.

THE irrepressible Charley Collins has now struck the biggest scheme of all. He will shortly issue a large edition of the Brule City Times, which will be, according to his own statement, the largest paper ever issued in the world. He is having it printed east at a cost of over \$10,000, and all for the benefit of those seeking homes in the west.

A WASHINGTON reporter of the Chicago Journal recently interviewed Wm. E. Chandler, Blaine's intimate friend, asking him upon what ground was based his opinion that Blaine would receive the Republican nomination at Chicago. Mr. Chandler said: "Upon the vote of the Illinois delegation, which we feel certain

will be cast for Blaine and not for Grant. The advices we get from Illinois are that Grant is not so popular there as his friends claim, and that General Logan and Mr. Washburne will not be able to influence the delegation for Grant. Without the vote of Illinois Grant will not be nominated, but with the vote of the state cast for Blaine, the latter will be certain to get the nomination."

THE recent blockade has demonstrated very forcibly the necessity of shorter divisions on the Northern Pacific. Two snow-plow outfits at Jamestown, this winter, one working each way, would have aided materially in the keeping open of the road, and the regular transmission of the mails. The run from Fargo to Bismarck is so long, and the trains pass over it so seldom that a storm extending over the whole line, is augmented by other storms before the track can be cleared of the first snow. Every successive storm only tend to prolong the delay as it packs closer and closer to the rail, which, being a first-class conductor of heat and electricity tends to melt the snow in its immediate vicinity, and it becomes solid ice upon the flange. Thus the necessity of constant travel. With the two outfits at Jamestown, suggested above, together with good plows at both Fargo and Bismarck, it is doubtful even with the low track, if there would have been more than three days blockade this winter.

In another column of THE TRIBUNE may be seen the dissolution notice of the "Bismarck, Ft. Lincoln and Black Hills Railway Company," pursuant to a resolution of the board of stockholders of said company. This move is made to allow a New York company of capitalists to go on with the road, which will be known as the "Dakota Railway Company." The company is already thoroughly organized and the money paid in for the completion of the road. Col. Sweet, general manager of the old company, has received a letter, dated Feb. 24th, from Prof. Laman, vice-president of the Dakota Company, in which that gentleman states that everything will be in readiness to begin operations next summer. A corps of engineers will be sent out to survey the line about the 15th of next month, or sooner if the weather will permit. As the new company is perfectly responsible there can be little doubt but that Bismarck will be a lively railroad center next season.

As the day of election draws near, the eye of the voter is turned to his choice for the various municipal officers to be elected. Thus far there is but one ticket in the field, and this an unquestionably good one, and one void of politics. But in the excitement of a new election sight is apt to be lost of the services of the present city government. The council has been, on the whole, the most economical, cautious, skillful and at the same time public-spirited government the city has ever had. The city is in good shape financially, and during the year many important public improvements have been made. The protection against fire, provided by this council, is, perhaps, the most effective on the line of the Northern Pacific. To the gentlemen who will supercede the present administration, THE TRIBUNE has this to say: Be as careful, judicious and upright in the management of public affairs as the present administration has been and no fault, whatever can be found.

THE Bismarck correspondent of the Deadwood Press says: "The new paper in Bismarck, to be called the Sun, will begin to shine just as soon as the material arrives. The snow blockade is the cause of delay. It has a bright future and will be found shining wherever light is needed. It is owned by three or four candidates for congress, and will support them all. It will favor a change in the channel of the Missouri river so that its candidates for congress can promise the Hills people a regular line of steamboats." Perhaps a deepening of the channel will be necessary for a successful sailing of the new bark.

THE Black Hills Times, the Republican paper of the Hills, comes out squarely for Marshal Raymond for Dakota's next delegate. While there may be no doubt of Raymond's honesty, ability and popularity, yet, why not let good enough alone. No more can be said in Raymond's favor than for Judge Bennett, who is honest, faithful, energetic and persevering. His ability to better serve his constituents another term has been increased by his experience at Washington during the first.

THE first copy of the Bismarck Sun proper was issued at Fargo. This week it was issued in THE TRIBUNE office, a couple of imposing stones, a rack of type, etc., being set apart for that purpose. All Jimmy wants is the appliances to produce a good-looking Sun.

INDIAN Territory is said to have a delightful climate and thousands of white

settlers are now flocking to that country. The government is undertaking to put a stop to the business but it is thought that the matter will finally terminate as did the objections to white invaders of the Black Hills. When driven from Indian Territory what will become of the aboriginal American?

THE North Pacific people are now doing everything in their power to raise the blockade. The trouble is, they commenced active operations too late. Perhaps when the board of directors meet to consider the matter it will be said unto the responsible man "ye knew your duty but ye did it not. Go thou, thy salvation's lost."

As a specimen of the kind of stuff the democratic party is composed of in Dakota, the case of Dr. Meyer, chairman of the territorial central democratic committee and an aspirant for congress, is a striking illustration. He last week married a demmi monde of the Mollie Johnson family.

It is with feelings of indescribable pleasure that we commend our new contemporary, the Bismarck Sun, to the people of this country. THE TRIBUNE bespeaks for it a wide-spread popularity, only exceeded by that which its able publisher at present enjoys.

THE Bismarck correspondent of the Deadwood Press should be tarred and feathered for terming that great international newspaper, "the Jamestown Alert." The people of Jamestown should kick against this familiarity on the part of "Prago."

### THE INDIAN COUNTRY.

O'Brien and Parshall's Reception With the Red Men.

(Special Correspondence of The Tribune.)  
FORT BUFORD, D. T., March 1.—George Grinnell, Esq., who just arrived from Poplar Creek, reports nine hundred lodges of Yanktons and hostile Sioux camped at that place. The government issues rations to them, providing each company of Indians turns in a pony and a gun. The consequence is, the warehouse is filled with old flintlocks, pistols, bows, arrows, etc., and the corral is full of "crow-baits" that will bring the government about \$4 per head. The Indians look savage and gaunt from the lack of buffalo meat, and the chances are brilliant for trouble in the spring. John O'Brien and Parshall, two wolves, were caught on the divide between Poplar Creek and Glendive, by a party of hostiles, who tied them to a tree, whipped them severely with bullberry brush, then gathered a quantity of prickly pear, made a bed of them, and compelled them to sleep (or rather lay) on them all night. A storm arising towards morning, and the pain becoming unendurable, they made a dash for liberty, and succeeded in escaping. They tramped through the crust and over the prairie four days with nothing to eat, and finally wound up at Jordan's ranch on the Yellowstone, frost bitten fearfully. The Yanktons are peaceably disposed while the others are merely awaiting green grass.

### A Famous Artist.

Constantine Brumidi, the famous fresco artist, died in Washington recently. Mr. Brumidi has, for the past twenty years, been employed at the capitol by the government in frescoing that building, and he leaves behind him many of the finest pieces of fresco in existence, the dome of St. Peter's at Rome not excepted. His master piece was the large picture representing agriculture, commerce mechanics and the arts and sciences painted in the top of the dome, and which shows to its best advantage from the floor, 150 feet or over below. At the time of his death Mr. Brumidi was engaged in painting an immense picture encircling the entire dome, and some fifty feet above the floor, representing, in imitation of bas-relief, the history of this country from the landing of Columbus to the present time, the several decades being marked by prominent historical events. So true is the effect of light and shade in this immense unfinished picture that connoisseurs, strangers at the capitol have lost wagers in betting that it was chiseled in the marble. This last work was intended by Mr. Brumidi to be his monument, and though unfinished, it will carry his name down to future generations, ranking with Michael Angelo and Raphael. Mr. Brumidi was an Italian and about eighty years of age.
