## Butler Again on the Track.

BOSTON, Aug. 18.—In the state greenback convention to-day, after a rambling discussion as to the relative merits of different gentlemen whose names were brought up, the convention proceeded to ballot with the following result: Whole number of votes, 156; necessary to choice, 79; B. F. Butler had 67; Judge Andrews, 52; John M. Devine, 37. There being no choice, the name of Devine was withdrawn. Second ballot—whole number of votes, 136; necessary to choice, 69; B. F. Butler had 76; Judge Andrews, 46; Devine, 13; Sargent, 10. Gen. Butler was declared nominated.

## Sensation at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—At a meeting of the county board for equalization this afternoon Hugh Maher, assessor of the town of Hyde Park, presented an affidavit that a prominent citizen, whose name was not given, tried to bribe him with an offer of \$1,000 to reduce the assessment of the Pullman company in that town. The announcement created a sensation. The attorney for the company being interviewed, denied the affidavit. It is understood the matter will be brought to the attention of the grand jury.

## The Pittsburg Strike "Busted."

PITTSBURG, Aug. 18.—The most important break that has yet occurred in the ranks of the striking miners took place to-day, when a body of miners marched out of the strikers' camp and proceeded to the works of the Mansfield Coal and Coke company, where they offered their services at the three and a half rate. This action is regarded by operators as the forerunner of a general break, which will follow in a few days and end the strike.

## Important Strike at Bloomington.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Aug. 18.—In consequence of a reduction in the hours of labor from 10 to 9 hours per day, nearly all the laborers in the Chicago & Alton machine shops quit work at noon. They include the entire force of the iron works and some of the wood workers. Their demands have not yet been formulated, but they will probably ask an advance of 10 per cent. in order to make the wages the same as before the reduction.

## Another Infernal Box.

VIENNA, Aug. 18.—A dispatch from Trieste says a steamer that arrived to-day from Venice had on board a box, which was opened by the police and found to contain bombs and petards, and also documents proving that the torch light procession last night in the celebration of the emperor's birthday was intended to be made the occasion for further outrages. Previously to opening the box the consignee was arrested.

## A \$25,000 Rail Wreck.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—A serious collision occurred to-day between two freight trains, one following the other, on the Illinois Central road, south of the city. An engine, caboose and about twenty-five freight cars were smashed. The loss is estimated at \$25,000. An unknown man asleep in the caboose was fatally scalded. The track was obstructed for two hours and a half.

## Ravished a Nine-Year-Old.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 18.—An Andersonville special to the Leader reports great excitement there over an outrage by a tramp yesterday, who found a nine-year-old daughter of James Taylor picking berries a few miles from home, and with a revolver compelled her to follow him to a secluded spot, where he ravished her.

## West Point in Danger.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Aug. 18.—The woods on the crests of Crow Nest and Storm King, in the highlands, are burning. Farmers are fighting the fire, and as it appears to be spreading towards West Point, enlisted men have also been sent forward to check its progress. Considerable cordwood is endangered.

## Snatching the Lottery Business.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—At the instance of several citizens, the lottery shops of the city were raided by the police and the agents of the Havana, Louisiana State and Commonwealth lotteries arrested. The association proposes to make a strong effort to break up the business.

## The Fever at Brownsville.

BROWNSVILLE, Aug. 18.—There were thirty-eight new cases and one death from yellow fever to-day. The fever is increasing among Americans, and the disease seems to be on the increase at Matamoros, though the death rate is more favorable. Only three deaths there to-day.

## Gone to Glory.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 18.—The Gazette's McKinney, Texas, special says that Spade Rock Caldwell, colored, was hanged to-day for the murder of a farmer named W. R. Noville, near that place, in October, 1881. A great crowd was present at the execution.

## Piano Factory Burned.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Fire broke out to-night in a nine-story piano factory owned by Hardman, Dowling & Peck. Three alarms were sent out, and the flames are burning fiercely. The loss is probably heavy.

## Terrible Way to Die.

ANOKA, Minn., Aug. 19.—When the north bound passenger train on the Manitoba road arrived at the depot at 2:30 this morning, the engineer reported that he struck something heavy at a crossing half a mile beyond town. A party going back to investigate, found that the object struck was a carriage. The horse was found dead with fragments of the buggy some ten rods beyond the cross-

ing, and between that place and the crossing the bodies of four people were found, horribly mangled. The remains were taken to the depot and finally identified as those of Wm. Pickett, Jas. P. Cole, Miss Florence Parker and Miss Lillie Dawson. They were crushed and bruised so that identification was difficult. When found, Cole alone was breathing, the others being killed instantly. Cole died soon after. The girls were apparently about 17 years of age, and the men 22 or 23. They had attended a dance at Crooked Lake, about three miles from Anoka, in the evening, and were returning when the accident happened.

## Sixty or Seventy "Chumps."

ST. PAUL, Aug. 19.—A Rochester, Minn., correspondent sends a report of the doings of one Rev. G. Pridham, who travels under a host of titles, reckoning among his credentials the patronage of H. R. H. the prince of Wales. Some time ago he brought to Minnesota sixty or seventy young men of good families from England, who were to be taught practical farming. For the trouble and expense of bringing them over he received \$375 for each, and agreed that they should be well treated. They were to be apprenticed to farmers, Pridham giving \$80 to each farmer as a premium. The young men now come forward with a complaint charging their reverend protector with swindling them, and not living up to their contract. They were starved and ill treated on the way, and since he apprenticed them though he agreed to see them and if they were not satisfied to find them in other places. The young men claim to be left without means in a strange land and publicly proclaim Pridham a swindler.

## Report that Arabi Has Surrendered.

CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—A London special to the News says: There are rumors that Arabi has surrendered. Egyptian stocks have risen sharply. A Constantinople dispatch says the porte withdrew the agreement to send troops to Egypt and will prepare a protest against English occupation. The announcement creates a sensation.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Paris says: It is no secret that Russia is concentrating a formidable army in the Caucasus. The army it is estimated will number 75,000 men.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 19.—The government officially denies the reports relative to the concentration of troops in the Caucasus.

BERLIN, Aug. 19.—The Germans who suffered loss by the bombardment of Alexandria have presented petitions to the German government for compensation for losses.

## Yellow Jack Gets a Good Foothold.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—A telegram from Gov. Roberts, of Texas, was to-day received at the treasury department, stating the suffering condition of those sick with yellow fever, and of 2,000 persons in Brownsville out of employment on account of the quarantine, and asking aid. Acting Secretary French replied that the department would take charge of the hospitals and quarantine at suitable stations if the government desired it, but that the state of Texas must support all persons not in hospital. If the governor accedes to this, the surgeon general of the marine hospital will place guards at proper points to prevent egress from Brownsville, and will, through one of his surgeons, take charge of all hospital arrangements.

## A Remarkably Brutal Murder.

DUBLIN, Aug. 19.—One of the two boys wounded at the time the Joyce family were murdered has died of his wounds. He was only 14 years old. The other boy, who is but 12, is in a prostrate condition. He states that the assassins, who were disguised, numbered four or five. Joyce's mother was over 80 years of age. Part of her body was devoured by dogs before her corpse was discovered. The house in which the family lived presents a shocking spectacle. The bodies of the victims lie on the floor riddled with bullets, and mangled as if battered by hammers. The murder was the most horrible that ever disgraced even Ireland. Four persons have been arrested on suspicion.

## The Commissioners in Utah.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Aug. 19.—The Utah commissioners arrived in the city last night, and this evening were given a reception, which was attended by all classes and was quite informal. The Gentiles appear favorably impressed, knowing as they do that the commissioners have come here to perform an important duty assigned them by the government, they will study the situation before making public their programme. Being strangers, it is expected that the progress of the commissioners will be slow.

## Singular Railway Accident.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 19.—Last midnight, near Olney, Ill., the east-bound passenger train on the O. & M. road became detached from a sleeper and ran some distance ahead of it. Some one pulled the bell rope and the engineer stopped the train. The sleeper then struck it and telescoped a passenger car. Walter Challen, a lad residing in this city, was in the sleeper and was thrown from an upper berth and killed. Four or five passengers were badly injured.

## Democratic Nominations.

ST. PAUL, Aug. 19.—The democratic county convention to-day renominated Judges Brill and Simons, of the second judicial district.

## A Mayor's Bad Fix.

GRAND FORKS, D. T., Aug. 19.—Mayor McCormack says the suit brought against him by his mother-in-law, Mrs. Strong, is a piece of blackmail, and that he will make no effort to compromise, but will engage the best attorneys to defend him, and will fight the suit to the bitter end.

## Ben Hill's Funeral.

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 19.—Senator Ben Hill was buried this afternoon. The remains were escorted by the Atlanta bar and the congressional committee, with a long line of carriages. Fully 20,000 people assembled on the street to view the procession.

## Marshal Allen Sworn In.

YANKTON, Aug. 19.—Gen. Harrison Allen,

of Pennsylvania, was to-day sworn in as United States marshal of Dakota.

## Yankton's Artesian Well.

YANKTON, Aug. 19.—The new artesian well flow has increased since last night from twenty to sixty gallons a minute.

## Fire in Minneapolis.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 19.—Ferguson Bros.' hardware store burned this morning. Loss \$70,000; insured for \$48,000.

## The President Contributes.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—President Arthur has given \$200 for the Garfield memorial hospital.

TURBULENCE and vexation of spirit still hover about Canonchet, the home of ex-Gov. Sprague, made famous by the Conkling episode. A few days ago an auctioneer proceeded to Canonchet under authority from Treasurer Chaffee, to sell out the property. When the auctioneer and his party of bidders reached the premises they found workmen tearing up the bridge leading from the main road to the front driveway and all the gates on the premises fastened securely with log-chains. The party gained access to the grounds somehow, when they were met by Willie Sprague, the governor's son, who drew a pistol and ordered them to halt, which they did. The auctioneer then began to bid off the property, during which proceeding the governor sat grimly on the front piazza of the mansion, rifle in hand, awaiting the advance of the enemy. Notwithstanding these unfavorable circumstances the property brought \$62,500, the purchaser being Francis D. Moulton, the "mutual friend" of the Beecher-Tilton row.
