New Militia Company.

The new militia company completed its civil organization, adopted a name and transacted other important business Saturday. At the hour appointed for the meeting a large number were in attendance at the city hall and the liveliest interest was manifested.

A verbal report was made by the committee appointed to wait upon Acting Adjutant General Hughes and ascertain what steps were necessary to a legal organization, reported that they had performed their duty and that the company had now the right to form a civil organization to be known by any name that it might see fit to adopt.

Mr. Stacey, a committee of one, appointed to wait upon Emerson & Wakeman, reported that these gentlemen had generously tendered the use of the Athenaeum for drill purposes, free of charge, at any time that the hall was not otherwise occupied.

President, J. Hanauer; vice president, J. Tritten; secretary, Tom Cauby; secretary pro tem, F. L. Hines; treasurer, Frank Kihm.

Mr. Stacey then moved that the committee propose the names of five members to constitute a business committee, and stated that this committee would be the most important of all, as upon it would rest the responsibility of transacting all the company business.

On motion the business committee was requested to retire and agree upon a name for the proposed company. They brought in the name, "Garfield's Guards," which was unanimously and enthusiastically adopted.

On motion a committee was authorized to wait upon the business men of Bismarck and solicit subscriptions for the "Garfield's Guards" and the chair appointed Messrs. Cauby, Leo, Westhauser and Hanauer as such committee.

The Guards then proceeded to the election of honorary members, and the names of Hon. Alexander Hughes, John A. Rea, W. H. Francis, F. B. Gallen, W. A. Bentley, Rev. D. C. Plannett and E. M. Fuller, were proposed, and they were duly elected.

After other business had been transacted, Mr. Frank Kihm proposed the names of J. A. Baker, Deitrich Bros., Frank Donnelly, J. D. Wakeman and S. H. Emerson, as honorary members, and they will be voted upon at the next regular meeting.

President Hanauer, Secretary Cauby and others then invited any one present to subscribe toward a fund for the company any amount that they could afford, and each left off with a \$50 subscription. Others promptly responded until the grand total was swelled to the sum of \$875.
