Fort Lincoln. While no suggestion of a civilian is likely to influence the action of the military authorities, the TRIBUNE cannot refrain from speaking a word in favor of the maintenance of Fort Lincoln, concerning the abandonment of which much is now being said. In the first place, this is the only fort which bears the name of the immortal Abraham Lincoln, whose name should and does command the respect and reverence of every true American. But as a mere matter of expediency it would seem that Fort Lincoln, above all others in the northwest, should be preserved. Its location on the Missouri river and near the Northern Pacific road, makes it one of the very best supplying posts in the army, while it is in a position to aid in the quelling of an Indian outbreak which no other post save Yates commands. True, soldiers can be brought from Fort Keogh to points on the Northern Pacific in nearly as short a time as from Lincoln, but in case of trouble along the Missouri river, the latter fort is almost indispensable. It is earnestly desired by the people of the Missouri slope that the beautiful post will not be abandoned, and that the army will in the future as in the past have a substantial reminder, in one of its neatly preserved forts, of the grand and noble martyred president who guided the ship of state safely through its bloodiest and most terrible conflict, and guarded with unswerving patriotism the honor and purity of the stars and stripes.

The TRIBUNE is pained to learn that any question should be raised regarding the allegiance of James A. Emmons to the democratic party. Fort Lincoln's Claim. A private letter from one high in military circles sets aside all doubts as to the unreliability of the report that an order for the abandonment of Ft. Lincoln has been issued. In the first place there has been no appropriation made for the improvement of the posts to be enlarged, and if the order had been issued it would not be first known by an ex-private soldier. There is little doubt of the ultimate concentration of forces, at accessible and conveniently located posts in the northwest, and as the question is being agitated, it behooves the friends of Ft. Lincoln and all interested in its maintenance to take some action which may tend to guard it against the hand of abandonment and destruction. As the object of concentration is to curtail the expenses of the army and place the troops where they can be cheaply and readily supported or transported, why not take them from remote posts which have no railroad communication and locate them at Lincoln, which can be reached either by the Missouri river or the Northern Pacific road? Where is there a post which offers better inducements for the accommodation of a large number of troops where they can be supplied by both rail and water? Agitation is now progressing in this section for the circulation of a petition, praying that Fort Abraham Lincoln be made a permanent post and that when consolidation is effected, the post which bears the name of the martyred champion of human freedom be enlarged and adorned as its location and advantages most certainly warrant.
