

## CONVENTION OF MINE WORKERS IN KANSAS CITY

Kansas City, April 18.—The mine workers of district twenty-five met in convention here today to take up the strike matters. No proposition for a settlement has been received from the operators, who met in convention here Wednesday. President Perry, of the Southwestern operators, was interviewed and said: "We are through with the miners. How to handle our properties without them is the question we are now arranging."

### Outlook for Settlement Gloomy.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 18.—The convention of the miners of district fourteen met today and elected new officials, including Alexander Howatt as president. He assumed his duties at once. The delegates consider the outlook for a speedy settlement as gloomy. The Label mine, which was the scene of Saturday's riot, was operated today under a guard of armed union miners. A resolution was passed denouncing the red flag demonstration in the strongest terms.
