

FRENCH CAPITAL ORDERED MOVED

APPROACH OF GERMANS CAUSES GOVERNMENT TO BE MOVED.

FIERCE BATTLE RAGING

ALLIES MAKE DESPERATE ATTEMPT TO HOLD OFF THE INVADERS.

GERMANS STILL ADVANCING

But Little News of the Actual Fighting Drifts Through the Censors.

The seat of the French government is to be removed from Paris to Bourges, 225 miles southwest of Paris.

Regarding the program of the battle which the Germans are waging on French and Belgian soil, both French and British governments are virtually keeping silence.

Direct advices from the Russian capital give the official reports of a battle lasting seven days between the Russians and Austrians around Lemberg, capital of Galicia, in which the Russians were successful, forcing the Austrians to retreat and seizing heavily fortified positions.

French aviators have pursued a German aeroplane over Paris. There was an exchange of shots in the air but the German escaped.

Russia admits a serious defeat in east Prussia at the hands of the Germans. In this battle two Russian army corps and parts of two others were engaged.

An official report from Paris says a German cavalry corps marching toward the frontier of Champagne captured the British and the British captured ten guns.

Japan has landed thousands of troops in the Chinese port of Lungchow, 100 miles north of Peking. The Chinese government has ordered the Chinese frontier office against this alleged infringement on China's neutrality.

The United States cruiser Tennessee is to be used in the transportation of Americans from Havre to England.

Paris, Sept. 2.—(Special.)—A Government bill has just been passed by the government authorizing that the government departments shall be transferred temporarily to Bourges.

The high cost of supplementary defense work is proceeding vigorously. The proclamation follows: "By reason of the fact that our army corps have been engaged in fierce combats with the enemy, the courage of our soldiers has won for them a number of marked advantages."

"To watch over the national safety, the public authorities are obliged to take for the moment the city of Paris. Under the command of its eminent chief, the French army, full of courage and spirit, will defend the capital and its patriotic population against the invader. But the struggle for the honor of the nation and the reparation of violated rights will continue without a moment's cessation and without a stop of a failure. None of our armies has been broken."

"The government does not leave Paris without having assured a defense of the city and its entrenched camp by all means in its power. It knows it has not the need to reconquer to the admirable Parisian population a calm, resolution and sang-froid if it shows every day it is equal to its gravest duties."

"Resolutions are all worthy of these great circumstances. We shall gain a final victory and we shall gain it by national will, endurance and tenacity. A nation that will not persist and which in five retreats before a few months' sacrifice is said to vanish."

CLAYTON ANTI-TRUST BILL PASSES SENATE

VOTE ON LAST ANTITRUST MEASURE WAS 46 TO 16.

Now Goes to Conference, Where House Differences Will Be Adjusted.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Amended in many particulars the Sherman law and completes the administration's trust legislation program for this session at congress.

Seven Republican senators voted for the bill. Republican opponents of the bill include Senators Cullum, Johnson, Norris, Phillips and Jones.

The bill provides for the punishment of offenses of combinations, contracts or agreements in restraint of trade.

Sections of the bill relating to price discrimination and unfair competition were approved by the bill in the senate.

Lebor, agricultural and horticultural organizations not conducted for profit are exempted from the prohibitions relating to monopolies.

The maximum penalty fixed for violation of the provision prohibiting exclusive contracts is \$5,000 or one year's imprisonment or both.

Directors of railroads, under the terms of the bill, cannot be interlocked with corporations dealing in securities, railroad supplies or articles of commerce or contracts for transportation of passengers.

Another provision makes it a felony for officials of common carrier corporations to willfully misapply or permit misapplication of funds of the corporation.

President Wilson will delay his selection of the members of the new trade commission until after the measure has been harmonized with the Clayton bill by the conference reports.

AEROPLANES FOUGHT BATTLE IN THE AIR

HAD A BLOODLESS BATTLE OVER THE CITY OF PARIS.

GERMANS DRIVEN OFF

Three German Aeroplanes Fought in the Sky With Two French Machines.

PARIS, Sept. 2.—(Special.)—A fight in the air over Paris took place this evening. Three German aeroplanes hovered over the capital and immediately two French machines were sent up to engage them.

Although the rifles and machine guns mounted on public buildings kept up a constant fire, by this means one of the German machines became disabled and the other two were driven off.

The engagement seemed to turn to the disadvantage of the Germans, who retreated rapidly to a higher level and holding this position, were saved from further attack.

Another German aeroplane also escaped the fire of the guns and after circling about for a considerable time, disappeared from view.

Again Bombed at Antwerp. According to an Antwerp dispatch by the Evening News, the Zeppelin airship which appeared over Antwerp last night before 4 o'clock this morning, circled over the city and then disappeared.

At Deurle, two miles east of Antwerp, the Zeppelin apparently made efforts to reach the wireless installation. She dropped bombs and three houses were hit, four persons being wounded.
