MEXICO PRESENTS AN UNUSUAL PICTURE AT THIS TIME.

MEXICO CITY OUT OF IT

Carranza Makes Puebla His Capital While Aguas Calientes Is the Other.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 4.—Mexico, with two executives, had two capitals today and neither of them was Mexico City.

General Carranza, who for several days has been at Puebla, ordered his cabinet ministers with the archives of the government to proceed there.

The other capital is at Aguas Calientes, scene of the recent conference of revolutionary chiefs.

The Carranza general consulate here tonight announced definite information that several of the most important leaders had joined the Carranza side.

Among these were Gen. Alvaro Obregon, commander of the western military zone, who has acted as a neutral in the Carranza-Villa difficulty.

Gen. Lucio Blanco, cavalry commander of Obregon's division and formerly chief of the eastern zone.

Gen. Antonio Villarreal, who has been president of the Aguas Calientes convention.

Villarreal and Blanco left Aguas Calientes today for Mexico City.

Considering the troops commanded by these leaders, Carranza is in a much stronger position than his insurgent commander in the north.

Villa, however, has a much better organized army and superior equipment.

Will Attack Naco Again. SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 4.—"Governor" Magtorena is leading artillery and munitions of war south of Naco, according to reports received at southern department U. S. A. headquarters today.

The reports indicate that the forces under Magtorena will again move eastward to attack Naco. Benjamin Hill, who is holding the Mexican town of Naco. The latter is strongly entrenched.

NOTHING HEARD FROM BRITISH WARSHIPS

ENGLISH SIDE OF THE BIG NAVAL BATTLE IS YET TO BE TOLD.

GERMAN SHIPS UNHARMED

Longer Range of the Kaiser's Boats Were the Cause of the Victory.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 4.—No word came today from the British ships that engaged the German squadron off Coronel Sunday and the British side of the story is yet to be told.

According to German accounts, their armored cruisers Scharnhorst and Gneisenau and the light cruisers Nürnberg, Leipzig and Bremen escaped unscathed, while the British cruiser Albatross was sunk, the cruiser Goodhope put out of action and the cruiser Glasgow, with the transport Otranto, set scrapping for shelter in the neutral port of Talcahuano, where they are bottled up by the Leipzig and Bremen.

It is certain that the Scharnhorst, the Gneisenau and the Nürnberg arrived safely at Valparaiso, though somewhat the worse for their encounter with the British.

The report has it that the Glasgow, badly damaged, arrived in Coronel Bay, while the Otranto escaped to Puerto Montt. It has been impossible to determine the exact movements of these two vessels since the naval encounter. Despite the fact that the British had only three fighting ships as against five of the Germans, the decisive defeat of Rear Admiral Cradock's squadron appears to have proceeded a profound impression.

The battle took place in a heavy sea. The Germans opened fire at 10 kilometers and for a time all the British ships fell short. Later, when they got within range, their guns scored a few hits, but only a few hits, and the casualties among the German crews were said to consist of some half dozen wounded.

The German fire is described as excellent, though at the long range it required 400 hits to put the British out of the fight.

The Scharnhorst and Gneisenau came from Australia, calling on October 14 at Easter Island, where they took on large quantities of provisions.

British mail steamers in Chilean waters are sailing under the protection of Chilean torpedo boat destroyers.

ENGLISH FINANCIERS END CONFERENCE IN U.S.

HAVE ORDER IN ARRANGING COMMERCIAL INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Sir George Paish and Basil B. Blackett of the English treasury party have ended their conference with the federal reserve board and New York bankers, and tonight it was indicated that no further steps need be taken for the present to arrange for shipments of American gold to Europe.

The conferences here and in New York have brought the conviction that the matter of American debts abroad will be adjusted through the natural avenues of trade and through the special machinery already set up. The \$100,000,000 gold pool, the New York City syndicate and the American crops are expected to take care of the present American indebtedness.

It is said it will not even be necessary to arrange the proposed issue of short-term notes to match the balance in favor of England which the gold pool and the New York syndicate will leave.

Only one matter remains to be adjusted. There is still the fear that if the London stock exchange opens again for business, thousands of shares of American securities will be on the market at bargain prices bound to attract American investors. Such a dumping of American stocks would send the American balance on the wrong side of the ledger to the point where England might feel that she must ask for cash.

It has become apparent that the English government intends to allow the reopening of the London exchange in the near future. What measures it will be willing to take to prevent the sale of large quantities of American stocks were not revealed to night. It was suggested that the cooperation of American bankers would tend to make it hard for prospective buyers of such stocks to get loans here for this purpose. It has been the opinion in well-informed circles here that the New York stock exchange will stay closed until after the first of the year.

Whitman's Lead Over Glynn is 133,174. WADSWORTH FOR U. S. SENATOR DEFEATED GERARD BY 16,620 PLURALITY.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Revised returns on governor from all except 124 districts of the state—Whitman, Republican, 679,325; Glynn, Democrat, 537,151; Sulzer, Prohibitionist and American, 118,556, and Davenport, Progressive, 46,931. Whitman's lead over Glynn is 133,174.

Returns from all except 283 districts in the state for United States senator give the three leading candidates: Wadsworth, Republican, 599,283; Gerard, Democrat, 552,641; Colby, Progressive, 53,528. Wadsworth's plurality, 46,628.

Storing Cotton at Yale. YALE, Okla., Nov. 3.—There are now 454 bales of cotton stored in the bonded warehouse at this place. But a few of them are held by banks. Farmers are storing them on their own account. The price being paid here today by the cotton buyers is running from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 cents.
