

NO NEW EVIDENCE IN FAY CONSPIRACY

Confession of Leader Is Only Basis for Action by Government.

CONTINUE THE PROBE

Believe Real Story of Plot Has Not Yet Been Unearthed.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—All the alleged evidence obtained by the government against the five men charged with conspiracy in plotting to disintegrate the United States by means of bombs or the use of poison, is contained in the confession of Robert Fay, who says he was a lieutenant in the German army, and in the explosive materials found in his possession.

This was announced today by William J. Flynn, chief of the secret service, and H. Stannard Marshall, United States district attorney. Both officials asserted that none of the papers and letters taken from Fay's room in Weehawken, N. J., throw any light as to who were Fay's financial backers, if he had any, or tended to show any connection between Fay's acts in the United States and officials in Europe. Fay himself said in his confession that his plan to come to America and start war monthlies was approved by German secret service officials, but according to Mr. Marshall no evidence other than Fay's word has been obtained.

"The government is far from convinced that the real story of the plot has been unearthed," said Mr. Marshall. "We have not finished investigating. You have no basis for any further arrests."

Had Shells Ready.

That Fay had completed three steel shells with springs and clockwork mechanism ready for attachment to

in vessel and had the explosives prepared to place into the shells, was explained by police officials today in answer to questions whether the arrests of Fay and Walter L. Scholz, his brother-in-law, last Sunday, had not been made before sufficient evidence had been obtained against other persons. The police assert that had the arrests been delayed, it would have given Fay an opportunity to carry out his threat of placing a bomb on a ship.

John C. Knox, assistant United States district attorney, was sent to Weehawken to examine the scene where Fay carried on his experiments. He visited Fay's rooms and the boathouse on the Hudson river, where the explosives were stored.

The cases of the five men are to be presented to the federal grand jury next week. The Herbert Koenigsberg, charged with complicity in the conspiracy, obtained his release on \$25,000 bond today.

MAY BUILD BRIDGE ON ORIGINAL PLAN

But \$200,000 Arkansas River Structure Is Held Up at Present.

Work on the new Tulsa reinforced concrete bridge is still being held up pending the decision of the war department as to whether or not the Arkansas river, which is to span, is or is not a navigable stream.

Many Tulsans will journey soon to Little Rock, Ark., where they will join others in trying to have the stream declared navigable and to have it incorporated as such in the river and harbors bill. Should the stream be declared navigable the present plans would prove useless, as the war department then would only be permitted to erect a bridge.

It is understood that Representative James S. Davenport will soon go before the war department and ask for a permit to allow the bridge to be built for some weeks and the temporary office to be used have been built on the other side of the river.

All that is holding up the actual work of building is to secure the much-to-be-desired permit from the war department, and just so long as this hangs fire the work will be delayed.

It is believed that the work will be so restricted that it will be impossible to have the new bridge finished in contract time. An early solution of the problem by the war department is expected, and it is believed that the bridge will be erected along the lines originally planned.

DRUMRIGHT AGAIN HAS GAS SERVICE
