OKLAHOMA NEWS IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Changes in fourth-class Oklahoma postmasters are announced as follows: Meno, Major county, Frank K. Slaton, vice M. E. Vaughan, resigned; Wallace, Oklahoma county, Floyd W. Johnson, vice Joseph Wallace, resigned.

Congressman William H. Murray of Oklahoma, who has just returned from Oklahoma, has joined the army of group sufferers and is confined to his home in this city.

A postoffice has been established at Tar River, Oklahoma county, Okla., to be supplied by special mail service from Quapaw, four miles southeast. Governor C. Fulton of Commerce has been commissioned as the Tar River postmaster. James A. Collins has also been commissioned as postmaster at Arva.

Secretary Latta is said to have picked a successor to Solicitor P. C. West of the interior department, who has resigned to resume the practice of law at Tulsa. No intimation is given out as to Mr. Latta's choice, but it is known that an Oklahoman is not being considered. At the request of former Federal Judge A. G. C. Brier of Guthrie, who is said to have "fallen through" on a Senate nomination, Mr. Gore has withdrawn their endorsement of Judge Brier to succeed Mr. West.

Although his appointment has again been recommended by the Chickawasha, Indian Commissioner Seale is for some unknown reason holding up the reappointment of W. R. McIntosh of McAlester, Okla., as Chickawasha Indian trader, which position Mr. McIntosh has held for several years.

The senate banking and currency committee, of which Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma is chairman, has commenced hearings on a rural credits bill. The house banking and currency committee, of which Congressman W. W. Hastings of the Muskogee district is a member, is also venturing with the question of rural credits. It is expected that the committee will within the next twenty days report a rural credits bill which will meet with the approval of the farmers of the country. Mr. Hastings is an ardent believer in extending government aid to the farmers of the country in order that they may purchase and improve their own farms, and is of the opinion that a rural credits measure which will work in the interests of the farmers rather than the bankers will soon be favored.

WORKERS TO OWN A SPRINGS FACTORY

Co-Operative Plan to Prevail in Sand Springs Institution.

TO MAKE OVERALLS

Widows' Colony in Charge; Home to Furnish All the Investment.

Building of the overall and ladies' wear factory for the widows' colony at Sand Springs will be begun within a few weeks, and it is expected that the factory will be in operation by spring. The building will be donated by the Sand Springs Home, and the working capital of perhaps \$25,000 will be furnished by the home at a low rate of interest.

This factory will be co-operative in operation and all employees will share in the profits of the work. The co-operative system has been somewhat of a worker's dream for many years, and it is only within the past decade that the system has been worked out to a successful result.

How It Is Done. At Olympia the single weaver started their co-operative scheme without a cent having changed hands. Thereafter, mill, there where former employees, after the plant had closed down, bought it in installments.

from the owner for \$25,000, without a penny having been paid down. The workers themselves merely pay the responsibility of the rate of 10 cents per thousand for all shingles cut, over in Maryland, Wash., where another shingle plant had closed because of the owners' inability to operate at a profit, the weavers had closed out for the present year and in addition are purchasing it at a percentage of the full price.

These men had no security, except their personal integrity. They were, however, able to borrow sufficient money from the bank to put these jobs when the owner was unable to borrow the money.

Because the result is that labor leaders are eliminated in the mills where the workers are the actual or actual owners.

And to admit it is partly because the energies of a worker are devoted to a responsible share in a company's production and profits.

"It is," commented the Rev. Oscar McGill, chief pastor in organizing these co-operative mills, "a significant commentary on the industrial situation when workers have been able to do what employers couldn't."

In Everett, Wash., fifty single weavers who run a mill are earning more than the former scale of wages, ranging from \$2.50 to \$3, according to the job. Besides this, they pay a wage of 6 cents per thousand shingles out and 10 cents for riding.

A 20-cent rise in the shingle market recently added an extra \$1.50 per day. If the market continues to build, many mills on which the workers now have options will be converted into actual concerns.

The men who are most active in these plans are the workers whose unions the lumbermen smashed when cuts in wages were resisted with strikes.

"All this shows what the social application of Christianity can do for men," says the logger preacher, now at the head of the selling agency of these co-operative shingle mills, though still retaining his forest pastor.



SECOND TRIAL OF DAVIS IS NOW ON

Brother Convicted at First Hearing; Charged With Killing Marshal.

Special to The World. (CLAREMONT, Okla., Jan. 17.—The second trial of John Davis, charged with complicity in the murder of Marshal K. C. Wolfingerberger at Collinsville on the night of May 28, last, started in this district court in Claremore Monday morning, and the greater part of the day was devoted to the securing of a jury to hear the case. This proved a hard task, owing to the great publicity which was given the case throughout the country during the first trial, which occurred in September last.

John Davis, together with his brother Joe, are alleged to have on May 28 last, after a slight altercation had arisen between the three, knocked Wolfingerberger down, after which they jumped him and while one held him the other proceeded to inflict several large gashes about the man's head and chest, one slash completely severing the jugular vein, death resulting within a few minutes.

At a special term of the Rogers county district court, held in September last, the two brothers were tried jointly for the crime and while the jury found Joe Davis guilty of manslaughter in the first degree, and punishment was assessed by the court at 25 years in the state penitentiary, the case resulted in a mistrial for John, it having been stated that the jury stood throughout several hours deliberation but to two for conviction.

All through the first trial it was readily evident that Joe, the older of the two brothers, was endeavoring to shoulder the burden of the actual commission of the crime and hoped to receive a light sentence on a plea of temporary insanity.

The present trial probably will claim the attention of the court for the greater part of the week.
