Pal's Eye Now Well and Big Bout Occurs Week From Tonight.

### IN THE OPEN AIR

Boys Training Hard; Advance Sale to Open Last of the Week.

The bout was to have been staged at the Convention hall last Thursday night during the Press convention, but Moore's left eye became infected and a postponement was necessary. Yesterday the doctors stated that the injured optic was practically "as good as new" and Moore could go ahead with his training. Hamann has been working right along. The last three days before next Tuesday both Moore and Hamann will work out in public, probably at the ball park. Some unusually good preliminaries are now being arranged under the auspices of the Tulsa Press club. A big house is assured. When the bout was postponed last week the advance sale had passed the \$500 mark and this money was all refunded. Fans from many towns have sent in requests for reservations, for they realize that this will be one of the highest class boxing shows ever staged in Oklahoma. His Father Drives an Auto. ### DRUNKS ASKED TO TELL THE SOURCE

Startling Innovation Introduced in the Municipal Court.

### NEW OFFICERS IN

Price for Intoxication Is Raised to \$15; an Unusual Session.

Something unusual happened in municipal court yesterday. It was the first day for two newly appointed officers, Police Court Judge F. O. Cavit and City Attorney John B. Meserve. When court was convened there was a long line of Saturday night and Sunday "drunks" in front of the bar of justice. The first prisoner was called up. He pleaded guilty to being drunk. Judge Cavit was about to assess the fine. "Wait a moment," said the city attorney with a wave of his hand. Then, turning to the prisoner, he asked: "How many drinks did you have?" "Only five," the defendant responded. "Where did you get them?" "At the Crescent drug store." "Out of a bottle or over a bar?" "Over a bar." "Was the man who sold it to you white or black?" "White." "Could you identify him if you saw him?" "Yes." Attorney Meserve immediately went to the telephone and called the county attorney's office. "Your offer to co-operate with us in enforcing the law," said Mr. Meserve, "is to be commended and we've got a case down here. A prisoner of color to identify the man who sold him liquor. Kindly swear out an information, we have the evidence. And thus it went during the entire morning session of police court. If a "drunk" could not "remember" where he got the booze he was sent back to jail to "think it over." The usual fine of \$5 for drunkenness was raised to \$10 and in some cases \$15 by Judge Cavit. It is evident that those individuals who are engaged in the business of dispensing joy water had better "wake up" and take care of their drunks, or refuse to sell drinks to men who get drunk, if they want to keep out of the jail, for the plans of the new city court officials are apparently bearing fruit.

### TULSA YOUNG MAN GOING TO EUROPE

E. Kaselack Will Represent Y. M. C. A. in the Teuton Trenches.

According to a letter received yesterday by Tulsa friends, E. Kaselack, former salesman for the Rex Sales company, sailed for Austria May 11, where he will take up his duties as foreign worker under the International Young Men's Christian association. Mr. Kaselack is considered by the local association as their official representative in the trenches of Europe, as it was on their recommendation that he was accepted as a worker. Mr. Kaselack's work will be with the German and Austrian armies in Austria and he will work among the Russian prisoners. His task has been described as being "to keep them from going crazy."

Mr. Kaselack is a native of Germany, but has been in America for 25 years and is a thorough American. In addition to speaking German he is proficient in the Russian language. He was for several years representative of the International Harvester company in Russia, having introduced that concern's wares into southern Russia. Is Married Man. He is a married man and has two sons. His wife and two sons, who are 17 and 19 years of age, will arrive in Tulsa next week, where they will live until the mission of husband and father is ended. Mr. Kaselack had only lived in Tulsa for about a year, but in that time he became very popular and was a prominent member of the Tulsa Y. M. C. A. He will be one of the great army of Christian workers which America is sending to all parts of Europe to lessen the trials of the privates. Great financiers and philanthropists of this country are devoting time and money to the new movement and the various belligerent countries are aiding the work in every way. England has appropriated \$750,000 for the continuance of the work among their troops, Russia has \$250,000, the Russell Sage foundation \$50,000, John Wanamaker \$100,000 and Germany a monthly allowance of \$100,000. The International Y. M. C. A. is handling it for all the countries and the United States is supplying the men.


