Burkburnett News.

DALLAS, Feb. 27.—Another outside test in the north-northwest edge of the Burkburnett territory is reported today. The McGraw Oil company's test, which is a short distance north of the Clint Wood well in the northwest edge of the pool. The McGraw well is somewhat in between the Hammond-Ray well on the Chenault, near the railroad north of town, and the Hammond Art hole on the Fiske, half a mile beyond the Humble Oil & Refining Co. well on the Herndon farm, west of town, the Hammond Ray, and the Hammond Art are both failures in the Burkburnett sand, and with the McGraw failure draws a quarter circle around the pool from north to west.

The Eagle Oil company's failure on the Hardin, southwest of town, may be a break.
The Burkburnett well across the river is not yet in. In the meanwhile stock of the Burkburnett company is offered six for one. Undoubtedly stock juggling is holding up the drilling of the well, simply to make a broad guess, it might be said that the indications are that the men on the inside, as to conditions of the well, are selling rather than buying, stock, which would indicate the prospects of the well do not appear good.

Many Rumors of Wildcat Wells.

Reports of a well in Palo Pinto county apparently narrow down to the Roxana Petroleum company's test on the Skeman farm, which is drilling at 2,480 feet, with nothing showing to that depth. Reports of a big well near Weatherford appear to have no more foundation than the Hart & Griffith test, which may have a little water but no oil. There is no foundation for the report that Cosden & Co. has an oil well in one of their Jack county tests. In Young county the Empire Gas & Fuel company has shot the No. 1 Lyles, with no result; another shot will probably be tried. In Callahan county the Harvel well near Putnam is probably full of oil, but it took the hole about two months to fill up. In Jack county, DeFret, et al. have got a show of oil at 1,370 feet on the A. J. Myers farm, but it does not at this time appear important.

Texas News.
N. E. Bailey, banker and contractor of Klef, Okla., is moving in tools on the W. H. Bowers and associates' block, east of Jacksboro, Jack county, Texas, on the Cherryhomes lands, for a 4,000-foot test. Mr. Bailey is one of the "go getters," and is making a success in contracting as well as in banking, and this, along with W. H. Rossier's phenomenal luck, should make this the most important test a winner.
The Humble-Goss well in Eastland county, which came in two or three days ago a 150-barrel producer, is reported to be decreasing in oil production and increasing in salt water. If this report is true it indicates water in the sand, and makes things look less bright in that vicinity.

Marland Refining Co. Gets Producer.
The Marland Refining company No. 12 Willie Cry farm, in Adams county, was completed yesterday and is rated a 250-barrel producer in the 2,100-foot sand. The well put 163 barrels in the tank in 15 hours, actual gauge.

Latest Texas News.

DALLAS, Texas, Feb. 27.—Humble Oil & Refining Co. in western Comanche county is making 100 barrels of oil and some sulphur water, according to information direct from company's office. Prairie No. 5 on the Slayden farm, Eastland county, is making 1,000 barrels of oil.
Editor's Note.—There are also rumors of a well on the townsite of Burkburnett in the deep pay, but they have not been confirmed.

Oil Production in the United States.
New oil wells to the number of 1,573 were completed in January, compared with 2,029 in December and 1,201 in January of last year. The new production amounted to 148,000 barrels, compared with 115,000 barrels of new production in December and only 50,000 barrels of production in January of last year. Crude petroleum stocks held by the pipe line companies the first of the year totaled 12,000,000 barrels, compared with 77,000,000 barrels the month before and 92,000,000 barrels a year before. The country's total production of gasoline for 1918 was 3,566,000,000 gallons, compared with 2,832,000 gallons in 1917. The petroleum production for 1918 totaled 342,000,000 barrels, compared with 328,000,000 barrels in 1917.

Prominent Kentuckians Here.
Dr. W. H. Young of Lexington, Judge J. N. Stevenson, Dr. L. C. Young, both of whom are from Winchester, and V. J. Bullett of Louisville, are in the city. Bullett is president of the Rex Oil & Gas Co. of Kentucky, and also of the Pyramid Oil company of Winchester. L. C. Young is vice president and general manager of both companies, and V. J. Bullett is treasurer of the Pyramid Oil company and president of the Lincoln Savings Bank & Trust Co. of Louisville. Dr. Waterhouse, formerly resident in Slatersville, W. Va., and is now living at Lexington, and is secretary of the same company.
The companies, represented by these gentlemen, own valuable oil property in the Big Sinking district of Lee County, Ky., and are looking over leases in Oklahoma with a view to buying here.

Disappointments as Well as Gushers at Ranger.
While gushers are booming the western edge of the Ranger pool, the disappointing results of abandoning their No. 1 J. L. Harrison at a depth of 3,720 feet; the hole is filled with salt water. This is one of the most remarkable failures yet recorded in the Ranger district for it is practically surrounded by big well territory and offsets an unusually good well.
The Humble Oil & Refining company, test on the Patton, R. D. Sparks survey, is finally completed as a 40-barrel well, after two or three shots. The total depth about 3,600 feet.
McMann et al. in their test on McDowell town lots, in the town of Ranger, has finally been completed as a 20-barrel well after being shot twice.

James King Duffy in Town.
James King Duffy, president of the Export Oil corporation, and the Phoenix Refining company, arrived in Tulsa yesterday, and will attend a meeting of the former corporation Saturday. He reports that Donald Slinguff, sales manager of the Export Oil corporation, has just returned from London on the tanker Saracut, having been unable to obtain housing on the big liners. Mr. Slinguff will be in Tulsa this morning and will certainly have an interesting story of his trip across the Atlantic, and a series of storms which sent a half-dozen transports seeking shelter.

Big Gas Well at Beggs.
Messrs. Tom Wood, Frank Billings and Tandy C. Young have a 12,000,000 or 15,000,000 gas well in the northwest corner of the southeast of 21-13-12 at 4 feet in the sand, the top of which was found at 2,200 feet. This is a better proposition than a real oil well.

Butler County, Kansas.
The Inland Oil company is shut down at the pay, waiting on the shot in their test on the W. H. Slum B farm well, located in the northwest of the southwest of section 25-26-5. The top of the sand was touched at 2,710, and the total depth is 2,756 feet.
The Mid-Kansas & Inland Oil Co.'s test on the E. A. Hinson farm, in the east half of the northeast of the east quarter of the southeast of 35-26-5 is drilling at 1,015 feet. No. 3 on the same farm is underdraining for the 2 1/2-inch at 1,930 feet, and No. 5 is spudding in.

Showing East of Duke-Knowles Pool.
The Acme Oil company has a hole on the Clayton farm in Erath county, three miles east of the Duke-Knowles pool, which is showing oil and gas at 2,958 feet; the well has shut down.
The Plains Oil & Gas company, initial well on the Herndon farm, 4,000 feet north of the Duke-Knowles pool, is producing at the rate of about 400 barrels, depth 2,890 feet, reports that this well is making 5,300 or 6,000 barrels, are incorrect.

Gladys Belle Operations in Oklahoma and Texas.
The Gladys Belle Oil company's No. 1 C. K. Walker, at the center of the south line of the southwest of the southwest of 1-13-11, is plugging back to shoot the upper sand.


