STATE ROAD BILL WINS IN SENATE

Approval Given Fifty Million Dollar Highway Measure; Vote 37 to 3.

ELECTION SET FOR MAY 16

Governor Is Given Privilege to Change Time If He Chooses to Do So.

FIRST YEAR SALE 6 MILLION

Offering of 14 Million May Be Made in Second Year and 30 in Third Year.

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 21.—The \$10,000,000 good roads bill, as agreed upon by house and senate conferees, passed the senate finally today by a vote of 37 to 3. The special election for voting the bond issue is fixed by the bill for May 16, although the governor is given the privilege of setting another date if he sees fit.

Under the terms of the measure, sale of bonds for the first year will be limited to \$10,000,000, for the second year, \$14,000,000, and for the third year, \$20,000,000.

The bill has been under consideration for some weeks and after being passed in different forms by both houses was referred to a conference committee.

After the senate had passed its original bill differing widely in the matter of routes from the house the lower branch refused to give its sanction to the provisions of the senate bill and the whole question was thrown into conference.
