

REFUSES TO RESCIND COAL STRIKE ORDERS

President Wilkinson of District 21 declines to obey Garfield's directions to submit case.

ASKS HEARING OF GRIEVANCE

Fuel Administrator Sends Instructions to Miners' Chief Who Says Authority is Exceeded.

MURKOWITZ, Okla., April 14.—John Wilkinson, president of district 21 United Mine Workers, this afternoon refused to rescind the order for a strike of 4,000 miners in all the central and coke Co. properties in the southwest, although he was directed to do so by Dr. H. A. Garfield, federal fuel administrator, in a telegram received at noon. The strike began this morning.

"The strike will go on until we get satisfactory settlement," declared Mr. Wilkinson.

Dr. Garfield's telegram "directed" Mr. Wilkinson to rescind the order, and submit the grievance to the labor division of the administration for mediation, under the agreement of Jan. 23, 1918.

Mr. Wilkinson replied that the dispute over machine crews arose long time that it arose before the inauguration of the fuel administration, that it was a question unsettled by the machine commission designated to make a machine scale and that he "respectfully declined" to rescind the order. He cited Mr. Garfield to procedure in the McCaskey Edwards Coal company dispute at Pittsburg, Okla., where a strike has been on for many months and in which, he said, the fuel administration decided, after investigation, that it had no authority to force the company's compliance with its orders, because the dispute arose before the inauguration of the fuel administration.

DIAZ IS CONCENTRATING FORCES AGAINST CARRANZA

NEW YORK, April 14.—Advices received today from representatives of Gen. Felix Diaz, the Mexican revolutionary leader, announce that an increasing concentration of revolutionary troops is taking place in the states of Chiapas, Tlaxcala, Vera Cruz, Puebla and Michoacan, preliminary to a general offensive against Carranza forces. Roberto Gaxton, secretary to Gen. Aureliano Blanquet, who recently arrived in Mexico, announced today that general Diaz had sent official notice to all revolutionaries to force operating in the different Mexican states of Blanquet's arrival, and of his commission as second in command of the national reorganization army.

AMERICAN MISSION GOES TO BERLIN TO GET NEWS

PARIS, April 14.—Direct news from Bavaria still is lacking in peace conference circles. The overnight developments reported in the press, however, caused less confidence to be felt than previously that the German government would be able to control the situation.

An American mission comprising Messrs. E. A. Grosz, Edgworth and others, will leave tonight for Berlin for the purpose of keeping the American peace delegation informed of events.

Lumber Rates Unreasonable.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Rates on lumber and articles taking the same rates and on box barrels or smoke hooks and staves, in carloads, from New Orleans to certain Texas destinations, were found by the Interstate Commerce Commission to have been unreasonable in a decision today in the case of the New Orleans and Gulf Coast Lumber Co. and others against the Kansas City Southern railway company and other carriers. Reparation with interest will be allowed as soon as itemized statements of the overcharges are presented.

Demobilize Hun Officers.

BERLIN, Monday, April 14.—It is officially announced that German officers will be demobilized and will normally leave the army when the war industry is able to lighten the economic difficulties incident to their transfer to civil life.

COPENHAGEN, April 14.—A Vienna dispatch to the Acht Uhr Blatt of Berlin says that Herr Boehm, a member of the soviet ministry at Budapest, has arrived there and has declared that Archduke Joseph, Dr. Alexander Wekerle, former premier, and Baron Joseph Sotepreny, minister of commerce, have not been executed as was reported yesterday in Berlin. The archduke is said to be with his family at Alsbuth, while Dr. Wekerle and Baron Sotepreny are generally guarded in the prison at Budapest.

TRACTION SERVICE DENIED BY HUGHES

Issues Statement Saying He Has Had No Connection With Company as Charged at Hearing.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Charles E. Hughes, in a statement here today denied facts that he had been retained by New York traction interests or had received money from them, as had been asserted in testimony before the New York legislative inquiry now in progress.

"I have read the preposterous story published in the report of the Albany hearing," said Mr. Hughes. "That I had been paid \$50,000 by the traction interests to appear at the legislative hearing on the Carson-Martin bill. There is not a word of truth in it. I have not been retained by the traction interests and I have not received a dollar from them. The fact is that I was asked by the Equitable Life Insurance Company, the Equitable New York Life Mutual and Metropolitan, which are large holders of traction bonds, to represent them at the hearing before the legislative committee and to make an argument in support of the bill especially on the constitutional questions involved. This has been my only connection with the matter. I may add that I have not received a fee or rendered a bill, and when I do, it will be of course, simply a reasonable charge for the legal service.

"Aside from the public hearing I have not had any communication with any member of the legislature about the matter."

French Papers Now Praising President For Peace Position

PARIS, April 14.—(Havas)—The negotiations between the representatives of the allied and associated governments, virtually were completed Tuesday, the Echo de Paris says it learns from an authoritative source. The newspaper adds that at no time has the understanding between France and the United States been closer and that the French government is completely satisfied with the attitude of President Wilson. The Gazette says that the final agreement on the frontiers between Jugoslavia and Italy will be incorporated in the preliminary peace treaty with Germany.

British Astrologer Propheesies Another War to Start in 1926

LONDON, April 14.—There will be another world war beginning in June, 1926, according to a writer in the British Journal of Astrology. This prophet, who signs himself "Sephariah," asks for a serious hearing inasmuch as he claims to have published a year in advance in each case the exact date the war of 1914 and of the cessation of hostilities.

"The first phase of the next war he writes, 'will begin with Turkey, whose party will lead to its final overthrow in 1921-22. This time Prussian intrigue will dominate the position in the Near East, affecting Greece, Turkey and Prussia.' (This according to my calculations the great crisis will not be reached until June, 1925.)

"In this great war, which may be regarded as Prussia's counter of the war of 1914-18, the movement forces take their rise in Vienna and Berlin, ascend to Petrograd, penetrate through the whole of Russia and descend via the Black sea and Turkey in Asia, on the Syria and Palestine." Another allied victory is predicted by "Sephariah."

OKLAHOMA TO REQUIRE 25 CARS FOR DRAFT RECORDS

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Twenty-five touring cars will be required to carry Oklahoma draft board records to Washington, where they will be permanently filed under the custody of the adjutant general. All draft boards closed on March 31 and part of the Oklahoma records are already on the way here. Following the disposal of the records the various boards will post advertisements of sale and will receive sealed bids for various office supplies and equipment on hand at draft headquarters.
