

MISSIONARY CHARGE IS DENIED BY BOARD

Foreign Missions Body Says Report From Washington of German Aid in Bulgaria is Misleading.

INVESTIGATION IS ORDERED

Careful Probe Is Being Made and Will Be Followed by Action if Facts Are Substantiated.

BOSTON, April 17.—The American board of commerce for foreign missions is investigating the conduct of one of its missionaries who is reported to have engaged in pro-Bulgarian activities. The matter was brought to the attention of the office of the board here by the state department. It is made known that definite and decisive action will be taken as soon as the case is clear. In a statement today by Dr. William E. Strong, secretary of the educational department of the American board, declares the report from Washington yesterday was misleading and in most of its charges untrue. This report was received from the secretary of State Phillips and was that the board had been advised by the state department of formal charges of pro-German activities and political interference by missionaries both in Bulgaria and northern Persia. A specific charge was that the missionaries had used funds designed to aid war sufferers, to further the cause of Bulgaria and indirectly the cause of Germany and Austria-Hungary.

Dr. Strong pointed out that the American board had no missionaries in Persia and he added that no charges of pro-German activities by the American board of missionaries had been forwarded to the board by the state department. Later he issued the following statement: "The report, appearing in some of the morning papers, telegraphed from Washington, of pro-German activity by missionaries of the American board in sensational, misleading and in most of its charges untrue. The American board has no missionaries in Persia. It is certain that its missionaries are not pro-German in their sympathies. It is now carefully investigating a report brought to its attention by the state department of pro-Bulgarian activity on the part of one of its missionaries not now in Bulgaria. It is in communication with the state department thereabouts and will take definite and decisive action as soon as the case is cleared. There can be no question as to the loyalty of the American board and its missionaries to the United States and to the cause of all the allies."

SWISS COUNCIL IS READY TO RECOGNIZE HUN RULE

BERNE, Switzerland, April 17.—The Swiss federal council, it is reported, has decided to recognize the new German government on the ground that it was elected legally by the national assembly which was chosen by the votes of the people. The report has caused a sensation in political circles here.

A Copenhagen dispatch March 23 quoted a Berlin message as saying that President Ador of Switzerland replied cordially to a letter from President Ebert announcing his accession. It was added that Switzerland was the first foreign state formally to acknowledge the new German government.

Brother of George MacCurdy Dies. George H. J. MacCurdy received word yesterday of the death on Tuesday of his brother, Dwight L. MacCurdy, of Stockton, Cal., who passed away following a short illness of pneumonia. The young man's father left yesterday for California and will accompany the body to the former home of the family in Warrensburg, Mo., for burial. The deceased was western district manager of the International Correspondence school, which position he had held for the past 10 years.

MARINES WANT 150 RECRUITS A MONTH

Tulsa Station Expected to Maintain Its High Record of Enlistments.

Lieutenant Hornbostel, who is in charge of the district recruiting office of the United States marine corps, which is located in this city, announced yesterday that he is ready to receive applications from men who wish to become members of that fighting organization.

At present the marine corps has about 22,000 men in France and most of those men enlisted for the duration of the war, therefore the opportunity offered for service in France with the marine corps compares favorably with any other branch of the service. Fifteen thousand men are to be recruited at the rate of about 1,000 men per month, the quota of this district being 150 men per month and the lieutenant thinks that judging from the way the boys of this state joined the "devil dogs" during the war he should not fall behind any month in the present drive. Tulsa was accorded the honor of being the headquarters for the state due to the fact that this city gave more boys to the marine corps during the war than any other city in Oklahoma.

Martial Law in India

SIMLA, India, Monday, April 14. Martial law has been declared in the districts of Lahore and Amritsar, according to an announcement made here today. It is stated in the announcement that the government general is "satisfied that a state of open rebellion against authority exists in those districts."


