WASHINGTON, April 19.—Members of the department of commerce industrial board indicated today that the board would resume its price stabilization program without waiting for settlement of differences with the railroad administration over coal prices. THIRTY-FIFTH LEADES REPLIES TO GOV. ALLEN

NEW YORK, April 19.—General Berry, whose home is in Corning, N. Y., and who for 40 years has been an officer in the regular army, in speaking about the recently published criticism by Gov. Henry J. Allen of Kansas that the troops of the 35th division had suffered unusually heavy casualties in comparison with other divisions, said: "If Governor Allen is criticizing the action of the officers of the 35th division he is criticizing the plans of Marshal Foch, of course, Governor Allen can criticize if he wishes to, but we simply obeyed our orders and being assigned to attack the Hindenburg line at Bouquoy we attacked it and took it and in addition the cost in men was very high. It was not high when you consider what we accomplished."

Professor Thompson Dies

TROY, N. Y., April 19.—Prof. Dwight F. Thompson, president emeritus of the Pensacola Polytechnic institute, died this morning after a long illness. He was born in Bangor, Maine, and was graduated from Dartmouth in 1889. Professor Thompson edited and illustrated several text books and was an authority on Indian relics.

Navy Not in Contest

WASHINGTON, April 19.—The navy will follow the course of the war department and decline the invitation of the Army Club of America to participate in the Pulitzer trophy contests to be held in Atlantic City. This announcement was made today in a letter to Senator Fletcher of Florida from Assistant Secretary Roosevelt, who said that after conferences with war department officials it had been decided that it would be "impracticable and inadvisable" for the navy to participate.

Death List Increases

PARIS, April 19.—The death list in the railroad wreck at Crisse, northwest of Lens on Thursday, has mounted to 23, including 10 Americans. Forty-five persons were injured in the smash of the train, which was caused when an American train dived into a French troop train. Among the dead is a 10-year-old French boy who had been adopted as a mascot by American soldiers.

Strike Breaker Blinded

CAIRO, Wednesday, April 17.—Threats were made recently by terrorists to throw petrol on the strike breakers as they were leaving their work and the official communique today dealing with the current disorders reports two cases of violent threats on Tuesday, one man being badly blinded.

Resents Panama Criticism

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Former Senator Thompson of Kansas resigned today an open letter from President Pierce of Panama, denouncing as unwarranted statements made in a letter inserted by the senator in the Congressional Record at the last session from Brig. Gen. R. M. Hiltetford, commanding general of the canal zone, and a statement by Major Wells, judge advocate general, criticizing naval conditions in the zone and in the cities of Panama and Colon.

TULSAN PAYS BIG SUM FOR ORCHARD

LEAVENWORTH, Kansas, April 19.—E. D. George, an oil man of Tulsa, Okla., has bought the big Missouri Valley orchard company farm, comprising 800 acres of land in the southern part of this county. The price paid was \$100,000. The Missouri Valley Orchard company farm is considered one of the finest in this part of Kansas. Of the 800 acres 600 are planted in an apple orchard.

Bolshevist Forces Severely Defeated Along All Fronts

ARCHANGEL, Friday, April 18. Russian and British forces early today occupied the villages of Bolshe Ozorki and are pursuing the bolsheviks as they flee southward over roads knee deep in ice slush, toward the enemy base on the Volokoda railway at Pirovskaya.

Retreat Along Virtually All of the Front in Eastern Russia is Admitted by the Soviet Government in a Wireless Message Lated April 18 and Received Here Today.

In a successful attack Thursday by Russian troops attached to the allied forces operating on the Mirovskaya railway south of Krom, the allied forces gained complete control of Lake Vagnera and the main road north to the White sea, according to an official statement from the Russian war office today. The bolsheviks were driven 12 miles southward.
