Frisco Officials Hold System Conference Extending Over Two Days in Tulsa.

GO OVER TERMINALS TODAY

Colonel Douglas Appears Before Railroad Representatives to Tell of City's Needs.

Representing the entire system, traffic officials of the Frisco railroad to the number of 28 are in Tulsa attending a conference with Alexander Hilton, general traffic manager.

Tulsa was selected for this conference that the officials from all sections might visit the wonder city of the southwest and note its wonderful growth during recent years.

The Frisco officials were in conference at the Hotel Tulsa practically the entire day Monday, Tulsa in particular and Tulsa's needs from a railroad man's point of view was one of the issues discussed.

Colonel Douglas, general secretary of the chamber of commerce, spoke to the railroad men Monday afternoon. Colonel Douglas asked the Frisco men to use their influence in obtaining for the city a special ticket office and special train to Fort Worth, and Pullman service to points of import to Tulsa business.

No direct expression was obtained from the rail heads as to what would be done with the requests but Colonel Douglas was told in substance that Tulsa had the reputation of getting practically everything it ever wanted. The party will be continued on a tour of inspection of Tulsa and its enterprises, including some of the large refineries today. A coal car has been especially equipped with seats for the purpose.

Mr. Hilton and his party will leave in their special car for the east at 2 o'clock this afternoon.



ERB NOT SURPRISED AT TULSA'S SKYLINE

Organist Says Local Boys Leaving University of Illinois Attending Nothing to Imagination.

Prof. J. Lawrence Erb, director of the school of music and organist at the University of Illinois, arrived in the city Monday afternoon to appear in recital Monday evening at 8 o'clock at the dedication of the Wicks organ of Holy Family Catholic church, a gift of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Markham.

Prof. Erb was formerly president of the national supervisor's association of music of America. He has been associated with the University of Illinois in his present position for five years, in which he was organist of the Fourth Presbyterian church of Chicago.

When interviewed by a World reporter, Prof. Erb, with becoming modesty, was prone to talk more of the University of Illinois and its graduates than of himself.

"It is the only university in America where students are not required to pay for instruction in music," he said. "It is an extra for which charges are made elsewhere, but the University of Illinois gives that free to its other branches. We have from 2,000 to 3,000 students and a faculty of 800. Our social society has 250 voices, our symphony orchestra 50 pieces, and in the four parts of our university band there are 200 men."

The professor has recently celebrated the 25th anniversary of his organ work, though his youthful appearance belies such a statement. It is his custom to give a weekly recital on Sunday afternoon in the auditorium at the university, the last being the 143rd of his series.

In regard to the magnificent organ made in Poland, Ill., and installed here only last week, Prof. Erb said that the instrument had beautiful qualities. Its tones were especially good and pleasing, and the action responsive. He was delighted with the organ proper in the choir loft over the front entrance of the cathedral, but by means of a connecting cable 300 feet long, a section of it located behind the altar may be played from the same key-board with marvelous effect.

The victor had never been in Tulsa before, though he had formerly traveled in this section of the state. He expressed himself as pleased with the city and its progressive appearance, but would not acknowledge that he was surprised at our tall buildings, for he stated that a number of Tulsa boys now attend the university from which he just came, and their tales of the glories of their home city left nothing to the imagination.

Prof. Erb is at Hotel Ketchum, but leaves on an early afternoon train because of an engagement in southern Illinois, Thursday evening. He expects to return to Oklahoma in May, having been invited by Dean Hohnburg of the University of Oklahoma for the dedication of the auditorium and fine arts building at that time in Norman.

MORE TROOPS OF 42ND ARE ON THE WAY HOME

WASHINGTON, April 21.—About 7,000 officers and men of the 42nd (Rainbow) Division sailed from Great Britain, due at New York April 25. Among the officers on board are Major General George W. Read, commanding the division and Brigadier General Douglas MacArthur, commanding the 34th infantry brigade.

Units on board the Leviathan include the 149th and 150th field artillery, 34th infantry brigade headquarters, 145th infantry, 117th ammunition train headquarters, 42nd division military police, 117th sanitary train less ambulance companies 145, 144 and 147 (already sailed), 18 casual companies and 10 casual officers among whom is Major General Samuel D. Sturgis.

The transport Aquitania, due at New York April 22 has on board the 169th machine gun battalion, four casual companies, evacuation ambulance company No. 64, 305th and 306th machine gun battalions (77th division); 90 casual officers.

The Kroonland sailed from St. Nazaire for Newport News April 18 with the headquarters, medical detachment, and companies A to D, inclusive of the 169th machine gun battalion, detachment of headquarters 25th division; field and staff, headquarters 1st and 3rd battalions, companies E, G, H, I, K, L, and M, and of the 117th infantry; machine gun company of 134th infantry; 25th division military police; three convalescent detachments.

Night Court Suspends

NEW YORK, April 21.—After an experiment covering a period of nine years, the women's night court gave way to a day court for the trial of women charged with minor offenses. The new court over which Chief Magistrate William McAdoo presides, will try New Yorkers in its methods with women of the street in an attempt to make of it a moral clinic rather than a place of correction.

GOVERNMENT TO AID BUILDERS OF HOMES

Specialists Coming to Oklahoma to Perfect Financial Arrangements, Commissioner Says.

Every energy at the command of the government is being brought to bear for the purpose of making a success of the national campaign for home building and Tulsa is to receive her share of federal aid as practically the first city in the state to take serious notice of the national movement. If the plans of the chamber of commerce are carried out it is probable that a 10 weeks campaign for home building here will be called in the near future. The communication copied herewith was recently received at the chamber of commerce from Claude E. Connally, federal director and commissioner of labor at Oklahoma City.

We are advised by authorities in Washington that the United States is entering upon the greatest "home building campaign" ever undertaken by any nation. The department of labor in Washington is sending out home building specialists for the purpose of perfecting this work through local building and loan associations in the different cities over the country and conferences are being held for the purpose of perfecting the federal home loan bank in the different parts of the country for the purpose of assisting and making it possible for the workers to build and own their own homes by furnishing local building and loan associations with federal funds to assist in this work.

The writer is leaving Oklahoma for Washington for a conference with the United States department of labor officials on April 23rd to 25th, to discuss the subject of national employment service in co-operation with state and municipalities and to perfect a program for legislation. The purpose of the conference will be to define and establish the most effective form of relationship between the national and state employment agencies and in a general agreement bring out a definite objective toward which all may work to the end that a thorough and comprehensive public employment service may be permanently established.

I am today addressing a communal labor council in Tulsa, advising that I am taking this matter up with your organization and with the authorities in Washington and it might be advisable for your organization to get in touch with them for the purpose of securing their co-operation and assistance in this work.
