
RUSSIANS DEMAND ALLIES TO RECOGNIZE ALL STATES

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INJUNCTION AGAINST TEXAS POOL HALL LAW GRANTED

DALLAS, Texas, April 21.—A temporary injunction restraining the attorney general and other state officers of Texas from enforcing the anti-pool hall law which would have closed billiard and pool halls in the state on May 1, was issued by United States District Judge James C. Wilson, sitting in chambers at Fort Worth today, and later filed with the federal district clerk in Dallas.

The plaintiffs attack the law as denying them due process and equal protection of law as outlined in the first clause of the 14th amendment to the constitution of the United States. In issuing the injunction Judge Wilson upheld plaintiffs' contention, declaring "irreparable loss or damage would result to the plaintiffs unless a temporary restraining order is granted."

Judge J. M. McBurnick of Dallas attorney for plaintiffs in a state court today, said he was preparing to carry the case to the supreme court of the United States if necessary. The injunction is subject to modification, according to Judge McBurnick "that every peace officer and individual in Texas is restrained from enforcing the anti-pool hall law."

TAX LEAGUERS CALL OFF RUSSELL SPEECH


ROAD BOND DISCUSSION POSTPONED UNTIL AFTER VICTORY LOAN DRIVE.
