

PAGE ASKS ORLANDO TO QUIET ITALIANS

American Ambassador Calls on Premier in Rome and Says Situation Is Aggravated.

HOPES TO BRING CHANGE

Orlando Expresses Hope of Ameliorating Conditions—Says He Regrets Incidents on Peace.

ROME, April 29.—Thomas Nelson Page, the American ambassador, visited Premier Orlando today. The two men had a friendly conversation, in which the ambassador expressed regret at the situation that had arisen.

The ambassador said he thought the situation had been aggravated by Italian newspaper criticisms based on a wrong interpretation of President Wilson's attitude and added that all those interested in preserving good relations between the two countries should do their best to prevent such disturbing factors from having play.

President Wilson is challenged by the Giornale d'Italia to "appeal to his own parliament as Premier Orlando has done and to show the world that his policy has not unanimous support, like that given the Italian premier, but that of simply a majority of congress."

SAYS WIFE TOLD HIM SHE MADE A GREAT MISTAKE

Libbie Dysart states in her petition for divorce from John C. Dysart that since six months after the marriage, he has treated the plaintiff with utmost cruelty, compelling her to leave their home and reside with her parents.

Increases Orderad in Bell Exchanges Through Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 28.—Increases ranging from 20 to 60 per cent on all classes of service are ordered effective May 1.

In 123 exchanges throughout Oklahoma, according to a notice filed today with the state corporation commission by the Southwestern Bell Telephone company.

An analysis of the new rate is in progress by the corporation committee.

Oklahoma City and Tulsa are the only larger towns in the state not affected by the new order.

STATE IS CLIMBING BUT MUST DO MORE

Official Loan Total Is Now Near Sixteen Million Dollars in Victory Campaign.

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 29.—Officially Oklahoma has only subscribed \$15,942,912 of a quota of \$28,382,500 in the Victory loan drive.

This is slower progress than had been anticipated in view of the fact that many of the counties went over the top before volunteer day.

Urgent messages have been sent to 200 banks and to chairmen of those counties which are still delinquent, asking prompt action to meet their quota by Thursday.

Love county announced unofficially that it was over the top and that an official detailed report would follow immediately.

This was record work on the part of Love county, which began its campaign on April 28 at a great picnic at Marietta and went over in a day.

Up to 6 o'clock this evening the following counties in Oklahoma had not gone over the top: official-ly or unofficially.

Adair, Beaver, Blaine, Canadian, Carter, Cimarron, Cherokee, Craig, Creek, Cotton, Delaware, Ellis, Harper, Haskell, Kay, Latimer, LeFlore, Lincoln, Logan, McClain, Major, Marshall, Murray, Okfuskee, Pawnee, Payne, Pittsburg, Pottawatomie, Rogers, Seminole, Sequoyah, Texas, Tulsa, Wagoner, Washington, Woods, Woodward. State headquarters have expected that Tulsa and Muskogee would be over today, but neither quota had been reached.

Official reports coming in show that subscriptions are wide-spread over the state and a dozen counties are on the verge of reaching quotas.

Country banks especially are slow to send in their records of bonds absorbed in their communities and, although unofficially a total in excess of \$21,000,000 has been reached, the official list still shows approximately \$16,000,000.

Two hundred delinquent banks have been wired by the state director N. R. Graham and responses are expected tomorrow, which it is hoped will bring the official quota to a point in excess of \$20,000,000.

The race in the district between Oklahoma and Kansas has been close and diligent work on the part of committees and banks should be expected in advance of all other states.

"Oklahoma must meet her obligations in the great emergency," said Mr. Graham, "so why not finish the job now?"

CONDITION OF SAMUEL GOMPERS SATISFACTORY

NEW YORK, April 29.—The physicians attending Samuel Gompers, the president of the American federation of labor who was injured Sunday when a street car collided with a taxi cab in which he was riding, said his condition was considered satisfactory.

Examinations of the patient showed that one rib had been broken and the hip badly wrenched. Although his pulse and temperature were normal, the physicians insisted on Mr. Gompers remaining in bed, receiving no callers and refraining from reading.

His engagements for the immediate future have been cancelled. A large box of flowers was received from the white house and a note from Mr. Thomas Lipton.
