

AGENTS INSTRUCTED TO WATCH BREWERS

Department of Justice to Get Names of Those Who Continue Manufacturing After Midnight.

PROSECUTION WILL WAIT

Evidence May or May Not Be Used Depending on Ruling of Court—No Decision on 'Near Beer.'

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Agents of the department of justice have been instructed to obtain evidence showing what brewers continue to manufacture beer after midnight tomorrow when prohibition of the use of foods in manufacture of beer, wine or other intoxicating liquors becomes effective.

This evidence may or may not be used in prosecution of brewers, depending largely on what the federal court in New York decides in the beer case now pending there. Whether production of near beer after tomorrow midnight is prohibited, the department of justice has not ruled.

Manufacturers of wine or beer who continue to operate after May 1 will do so at their risk, although the department has not indicated intention of causing immediate arrests.

The act of November 21, 1918, considered by the department of justice purely as a forced food conservation measure provides that "after May 1, 1919, until the conclusion of the present war and until the termination of demobilization the date which shall be determined and proclaimed by the president of the United States, no grains, fruits, cereals or other food products shall be used in the manufacture or production of beer, wine or intoxicating malt liquor for beverage purposes."

If so-called "near beer" is to be considered beer because of the similarity in name or manufacturing process, its production will be prohibited after tomorrow night. If it is to be considered merely a malt liquor the prohibition will depend on whether it is intoxicating. Determination of this question has not been undertaken by the department of justice and no action to seek a court interpretation is contemplated at this time by the department. This apparently leaves the initiative to the determination of this question to manufacturers of near beer.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Brewers of the New York district as a matter of consistency with their legal fight to have beer of 2.4 per cent alcoholic content declared non-intoxicating.
