

SOONERS BEAT AGGIES IN DUAL TRACK MEET

Southern Men Score 94 to 26 of Farmers—Soft Track Handicaps Sprinters and Runners.

Special to The World. STILLWATER, Okla. May 13.—Oklahoma University romped away with a 94 to 26 score over Oklahoma A. and M. College in the annual dual track meet here Tuesday.

A soft track handicapped the sprinters and runners and no records were broken.

The Aggies counted but one first place, Ray winning the shot put.

While the touring party was at Neuenahr, a watering place near the Rhine, Les Patterson, a negro, and the lightweight champion of the A. E. F., bathed in the tub formerly used by the former German emperor.

AMERICAN ARMY CREWS TO ENTER HENLEY REGATTA

PARIS, May 13.—American army crews will enter the Henley regatta on the river Thames, July 4 and 5, with eight oar, (minus coxswain) four-oar and single sculls.

There will be no grand challenge cup this year. The Henley stewards have voted to substitute a service race with flying corps from every British army, Canada, Australia, New Zealand represented. The climax of the season's service rowing will be an inter-allied regatta two weeks after Henley. The entries, including the strong Henley contestants will include France, Belgium and Czechoslovakia.
