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Republicans Unite On These to Direct House Organization

Parties Complete Organization and Official Call by Wilson Received.

CLARK OPPOSITION FAILS

Expected Fight by Democratic Minority in House Does Not Materialize.

TO GET INTO MOTION SLOW

Little to Be Done First Week Aside from Routine Work—Republicans Control.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Plans for convening of the 66th congress in extraordinary session Monday noon were completed today with receipt of President Wilson's formal call and with the holding by the dominant political parties of their final organization conferences.

The opening session will be devoted to the routine affairs of organization and reading of President Wilson's called message. The principal organization feature will be the election of republican officers by both senate and house, marking the passing of control from the democrats to the republicans.

The session will get into motion slowly, little business being planned for the first week. Although the peace treaty, including the league of nations covenant, is not expected to be laid before the senate until next month, much speech-making on peace subjects is planned.

Clark Opposition Vanishes.

Three party conferences on inaugural procedure were held today. The house democrats met and by acclamation chose former Speaker Clark as their candidate for speaker and floor leader. Opposition to Mr. Clark previously expressed was not apparent at this meeting.

Under the compromise plan, a committee will be appointed to consider the advisability of choosing a legislative steering committee. Representative Sanders of Louisiana, formerly the resolution for appointment of the committee and it was carried unanimously. The Clark supporters having agreed to that program will be no fight on their candidates.

Representative Sanders of Virginia was elected conference chairman and Representative Ashbrook of Ohio, secretary.

Named Unanimously.

Mr. Clark also was named unanimously the democratic candidate for speaker and in his speech of acceptance told his democratic colleagues that if they would stick together "we will be able to work the republicans."

Speeches urging harmony and cooperation among the minority with praise for the administration of President Wilson, were made at the conference.

Clark Praised Wilson.

A man who cannot defend the democratic record of both the democratic congresses and the democratic administration is a stark idiot, declared former Speaker Flood, Virginia, Dewitt, Pennsylvania; Thomas Smith, New York; Sanders, Louisiana; Goff, Ohio; and Gandy, South Dakota. The 19 congress members of the major party means committee, headed by Representative Kitchen of North Carolina, party leader in the last congress, were re-elected by the conference and directed to make the assignments of democrats on the standing committees.

Senator Pittman of Nevada was chosen by democratic senators in conference today as their candidate for president pro tempore of the senate. Although conceding that the republicans were in a position to organize the senate, the democrats met to arrange a slate of officers for formal presentation.

The republicans, with a majority of two, are expected to elect Senator Cummins of Iowa as president pro tempore.

Major Floor Leader.

The choice of Senator Pittman was without opposition and the conference also re-elected unanimously.

Crew of One Missing Seaplane Is Picked Up After Going to Sea in Fog; Other Is Believed to Be Safe.

AVERAGE OF 90 MILES AN HOUR MADE

Read's Machine. Delayed in Start, Is First to Reach Azores, Making Trip in 13 Hours and 18 Minutes.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—With the American naval seaplane NC-4 moored safely in the harbor of Horta, Azores, and the NC-1 being towed to that port, after having been lost for more than 15 hours in the fog, the destroyers early today were searching for the NC-3, the third of the trio which left Trepassey Bay, N. F., late Friday in an attempt to reach Europe through the air.

When the NC-4 will start for Lisbon was not known, but it was believed that Commander Read would start at the earliest opportunity, although he may wait for the other two planes.

The navy department at 3 o'clock this morning had heard nothing additional from the lost NC-3, but officials were confident she already had been picked up or that destroyers would find her within a few hours.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Destroyers searching for the lost naval seaplane NC-1 have found the plane and Lieutenant Commander Bellinger and his crew have been taken aboard the steamship Ione. This report was made to the navy department late tonight in a dispatch received by cable from Horta, Azores.

The message to the navy department said: "U. S. S. Harding reports crew of NC-1 safe on board steamship Ione. Plane was being towed but towline parted. Latitude 39 degrees, 40 minutes north; longitude 30 degrees, 24 minutes west."
