

COOKS AND WAITERS VISIT FREE CLINIC

More Than 250 of Union Voluntarily Report for Examination Sunday and Monday.

More than 250 members of the cooks and waiters' union presented themselves voluntarily for examination and treatment of social diseases at 218-217-218-219 federal building Sunday and Monday, bringing the total up to more than 600 patients examined for these diseases in one week.

Dr. C. L. Reeder, county physician, is permanently in charge of the clinic, assisted by Dr. J. W. Gilbert, city physician, Doctors Childs, Henderson, Stallings, Levine and Miller.

Miss Hayman, head nurse of the Tulsa hospital, has accepted the place of nurse in charge of the women. Miss Hayman will assist Doctor Reeder permanently. She has had four years' experience in this same line of work in a clinic in Rotterdam, Holland. During the past week Miss Hayman has been treating 150 women per night, besides attending to the sterilization of all needles, syringes and other surgical instruments, giving the physicians in attendance all the service obtained in a first class hospital. Other permanent workers at the clinic are Miss Catherine Norris in charge of the card index system, and Miss Ruby Green and Floyd Robinson of the clerical department. Each treatment, patient's number and all data concerning each particular case must be recorded, beside a complete statement sent to the government daily.

"Boss," You Suah Am Wrong," Negro Pleads to Cops

Payne took the pistol from the woman and a "scruffing" resulted. Patrolman Whitney appeared on the scene and took the leading role, lodging both in the city jail.

Both showed signs of a hard "fistic" fight. The woman's hands were severely cut, in addition to several other minor bruises. They are being held on the charges of disturbing the peace and for carrying concealed weapons.

Monday's Divorce Record

NON-DELIVERY OF OIL RESULTS IN LAWSUIT

Cosden Company Sues for \$130,000 Against Peerless and Empire Refinery Corporations.

Asking judgment for \$130,000 for the alleged failure of the defendant companies to deliver fuel oil to the plaintiff under contract made May 25, 1918, suit was filed in district court Monday by the Cosden company against the Peerless Refining company and the Empire Refining company, in which the plaintiff seeks to recover damages through purchase of fuel oil at a higher rate after the refusal of the defendant, the Peerless company, to fulfill their contract, according to the pe-

tion, required the Peerless company to furnish 200 the plaintiff 220,000 barrels of fuel oil at a price of 65 cents a barrel. The defendant delivered and the plaintiff received and paid for 66,833 barrels, and then refused to further deliver the remaining 153,167 barrels of oil called for by the contract.

The Cosden company claims they were compelled to go in the open market to procure other fuel oil with which to fill their existing contracts, and were compelled to pay a higher price than the price specified in the contract with the Peerless company. The petition further sets out that the Empire Refining company is the successor of the Peerless company, and that the principal part of the stock of the latter company is held by the Empire company, which is, therefore, made a party to the suit.

TULSA BANKS CLOSED DURING CONVENTION

R. J. ALLISON IS SUED ON STOPPED PAYMENT CHECK

Asking judgment for \$2,589.70, attorney fees and interest, suit was filed in district court Monday by G. W. Webster against R. J. Allison, the plaintiff claiming the money to be due on a personal check made by the defendant November 10, 1918, and delivered to the plaintiff for a valuable consideration. Webster states that the money was in payment for what is described as the Ashley oil leases, and when taken to the bank the latter refused

payment on the instrument, and has since refused payment.
Rice Growers Win.
WASHINGTON, May 19.—The Southern Rice Growers' association today won its complaint before the interstate commerce commission against the Texas & New Orleans Railroad company and other carriers. The commission held that through rates and charges on rice in carloads from the Texas-Louisiana rice belt to consuming markets based upon the aggregate of the full local rates in and out of the milling points, were unreasonable.
