First Report of His Sudden Death While En Route Home After Business in Tulsa Proves False

Stricken with apoplexy while en route to his home in Lima, Ohio, after several days business stay here, J. R. Following the apoplexy stroke trainmen wired to Cincinnati that the wealthy banker of Lima had died, and this report later was sent to his home. Yesterday doctors held but little hope for recovery.
