They rush on long across the street, going east and west, until it is almost impossible for motor cars to get through.

# Binghamton, Minus Booze, Finds Itself Getting Rich

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—As the subject for the sixth of its series of prohibition studies, the Anti-Saloon League has chosen Binghamton, N. Y., a city of approximately 50,000 population, which went dry October 1, 1913.

In a summary of results there, issued yesterday, the league does not maintain that Binghamton has become dry. A wet township and a number of wet towns nearby have prevented that, but it does say the city has been 72 per cent dry for eight months, with the following results:

Real estate valuations increased 50 to 75 per cent; rents on principal business street increased approximately 20 per cent; department stores and other mercantile establishments report rapidly growing business; bank deposits and interest-bearing accounts largely increased; business of city court of more than 40 per cent; prohibition arrests dropped from an average of 160 a month to 50.

Prohibition costs the people of Binghamton \$1 a head a year to offset the loss of excise taxes, but already charity and other costs, formerly charged to liquor and amounting to \$100,000, have been materially reduced.

The league says its survey shows that one of the best places formerly occupied by a saloon is now occupied by a florery, and rents have been increased. One saloon property priced at \$25,000 when the city went dry is now held at \$40,000. Washington street, formerly known as the flower street, has been transformed into a business street for office retail trade. Real estate on this thoroughfare has increased more than \$20,000 in value.

Two of the larger hotels which

preached prohibition with some trepidation, are doing more business than ever, says the league. The Bennett is spending \$50,000 to improve.

The league reports one national bank gained \$241,000 in deposits, another \$781,000 and another \$397,000. One first company gained \$200,000 in the first six months of prohibition. The Binghamton savings bank gained \$700,000 and the Exchange \$250,000. All the banks have reported higher every Saturday night, with extra clerks on duty and the factories centered in Binghamton or nearby towns report the absence of blue Monday and a remarkable improvement in personnel.

Binghamton has three large department stores. Each reports better business since prohibition went into effect. It shows an increase of \$14,000 in the business of its children's department since last October. Collections in all lines have greatly improved the league says also.

# SUGGESTION OFFERED TO CURB PROFITEERS

### Oklahoma City Conference Brings Out a Unique Solution to Hold Retailer Down.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 9.—In view of the conference today of all the county attorneys of the state called by Governor Robertson to discuss means of curbing profiteering and speculation in necessities, the profiteer has been the chief subject of discussion among the heads of departments, employees and visitors at the statehouse. Various methods have been suggested as a means of halting the practice of gouging by dealers in necessities and publicity is regarded as one of the most effective weapons.

"Require the retailer to mark in plain figures his cost price and his selling price and see how quickly the breakworks of the profiteering army will crumble," was one of the suggestions. "I would make it a felony to charge exorbitant prices. If necessary to punish the legislate in special session to pass such a law the expense connected with a session would be trivial as compared with the saving effected. It is absolutely essential that some action be immediately taken. If a man is a thief and his friends and neighbors do not know it, he will likely continue in such practices and get away with it. But if it is apparent on the face of things that he is gouging his friends and neighbors

he won't have the courage to continue long."

From Okmulgee came the complaint of a man who said he was offered three and a half cents a pound for onions and in a few minutes when he inquired the selling price of the same commodity he was told that it was ten cents a pound. A Tulsa man asked a retailer to order a pair of women's shoes. The retailer went to the store and asked how much he must pay for the shoes and was told that the sell-

ing price was \$17. He displayed the woolen's hat, and told the retailer to take the shoes and "put into the Arkansas."
