

## BULGARIA GIVES UP LAND RIGHTS

Thrace Is Ceded to Allies to Be Disposed of Later On

## SERBS GET TERRITORY

Frontier to Be Modified to Advance of Neighboring Nation

## REPARATIONS ARE FIXED

Two and Quarter Billion Francs Demanded In 37 Years

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.**—A majority of the Bulgarian delegations to peace, entitled to the make demands by the American delegation, are asking the part in future the same general plan as the American treaty. "Many countries are interested in the American plan," said one of the members of the delegation for the admission of Bulgaria, such as the League of Nations, labor, social, navigation, maritime, prisoners of war, and graves.

"Regarding the change in the Bulgarian frontier, the important changes are to the south, where the Serbs enter western Thrace, the principal allied and associated powers are agreed to accept whatever the decision of this territory, the powers ultimately decide but it is stipulated that in any event Bulgaria's western frontiers shall be modified slightly in four places to Bulgaria's advantage."

"Bulgaria is required to pay reparations two and a quarter billions of francs in gold within 37 years.

The financial clauses are the same as those in the Austrian treaty.

"Bulgaria agrees to return to Greece, Rumelia, and the Serb, Croat, and Slovene state, the records, archives and articles of historical and artistic value which were taken from these countries during the war and livestock shall be returned within six months. As special compensation for the destruction of the Serbian coal mines, Bulgaria shall for five years deliver 50,000 tons of coal annually to the Serb, Croat and Slovene state.

"Bulgaria's economic center to the Aegean sea is insured by the allies.

Army Cut.

The Bulgarian army is to be reduced to 20,000 within three months with universal military service abolished and voluntary enlistment substituted. The number of gendarmes, customs officials and other armed guards shall not exceed 10,000 and there must exist only one military school. The manufacture of war materials will be confined to a single factory and the importation or ex-

mission to the reparations committee created by the German treaty.

The interallied commission, which shall be established at Sofia, shall consider the resources from time to time of Bulgaria and shall have power to recommend to the reparations commission the cancellation or postponement of any payments to be made by Bulgaria. The livestock to be surrendered, totaling 72,225 animals, goes to Greece, Romania, and Serbia, except, however, that

which shall be settled as provided for in the original and subsequent protocols to the obligations of the present treaty.

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## BULGARIANS GIVEN TERMS FOR PEACE

Ceremony Is Held at French Foreign Office with Clemenceau Presiding; Polk and White Represent U. S.

## HAVE 25 DAYS TO REPLY

Period Is Prescribed Within Which New Terms May Be Studied by the Bulgarian Delegation.

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.**—The Bulgarian government signed the text of the peace treaty today at the agency of French foreign offices.

This document was brief and formal. This leaves only the Turkish treaty to be presented.

Long time official speculation and newspaper correspondence were present at the quadrigree. The French from the Bolsheviks have forced General Petena out of Badonvaya, but apparently are not attempting to capture Kiev itself.

This represents an advance northward by the Poles of approximately 100 miles from the town of Horodoff on the east bank of the Dnieper river, 50 miles northeast of Minsk reported on September 16.

In a brief address M. Clemenceau told the Bulgarian plenipotentiaries that they had overhanded the overhanding of the German treaty at Versailles and the Austrian treaty at Berlin.
