TOTAL COUNTY AND STATE LEVY FIXED AT 46 MILLS

The total county and state tax levy for the fiscal year, as reported yesterday after the session of the county excise board, will be approximately 46 mills, an increase of 2.10 mills over last year.

The levy, as now fixed by the board, follows: County general levy, 4 mills; separate schools, 36 mills; high grade, 10 mills; county road and bridge fund, 2.90 mills.

In addition to this regular levy, the following 32¢ to be added to the levy: School, 17 mills; city, 16 mills; state, 1.50 mills.

There is still some doubt as to the exact figures for the county levy since it has not been definitely ascertained what levy will be made to provide the county sinking fund.

The levy is based on a total assessable valuation of \$185,000,000.

STREET CAR EMPLOYEES WANT WAGE INCREASES

Claiming that the terms of their contract signed six months ago following settlement of a three-day strike calls for an increase in wages in proportion to the increase in cost of living, street car employees of the Tulsa Street Railway Company, have decided to ask for more pay and will balance their request in proportion to the increase in living cost percentage since signing of the contract.

At a recent meeting the employees expressed an almost unanimous opinion that the cost of living has increased and that they are entitled to more pay as a consequence. They claim C. H. Bowler of Dayton, Ohio, president of the company, told them he would be glad to raise wages at any time the cost of living called for an increase. Members of the union, it is said, affirm there is no discontent over working conditions and that they are merely asking to request a raise, they feel due them.

A committee was appointed to investigate present living costs and compare same with those prevailing in April, the time the contract was signed.

MOORE RETURNS FOR TRIAL ON BOGUS CHECK CHARGE

Oryville T. Moore, returned from Oklahoma City after his arrest on a charge of passing a bogus check in this city September 22, entered a plea of not guilty at his arraignment before Justice H. J. Gray yesterday. He was committed to jail under bond of \$200 for preliminary hearing October 7.

Moore is accused of passing a check made on the Security State bank in the sum of \$15, on the firm of Baker Brothers, 408 South Broadway. The check being returned marked no funds. L. H. Baker, one of the firm, swore to a complaint filed in Gray's court, and Moore was arrested in Oklahoma City on the warrant and held for Tulsa county officers.
