

KRIEGER TRIAL SET FOR TULSA COUNTY

Judge Cole Decides That Fair Jury Can Be Had for Case of C. H. W. Member.

HEARING STARTS MONDAY

Position of Man Charged With Dynamiting of Paw Home Is Denied After Long Testimony.

After two and one-half days of introduction of testimony, going to prove or disprove the allegations of the petitioner that the defendant, Charles Krieger, accused of dynamiting a residence in this city October 23, 1917, could not receive a fair and impartial trial, the application for a change of venue to the district court of Pawnee county was granted by Judge Edmund S. Cole in Tulsa county district court yesterday afternoon.

At the conclusion of the hearing which lasted until about 2 o'clock, the court stated that while the alleged crime was committed in 1917 when there was high tension in the county over against the organization of which the defendant is a member, he believed the country had returned normal composite relative to the matter and that a jury of 12 men can be found who will render an impartial verdict at the conclusion of the case.

OKLAHOMA WHEAT AND CORN SHOWS UP IN KANSAS

"Kansas has a reputation as a state where corn and wheat are raised abundantly, but they fell down flat this year with the grain crop," says Paul Meyers, president of the Tulsa county free fair association, who spent a week at the Dry Farming show at Wichita.

While the wheat exhibits at the Wichita exposition were good, Oklahoma had equally as good wheat, Mr. Meyers said. The Kansas corn, he said, did not compare at all with that grown in Tulsa county and other northeastern Oklahoma counties.

The Tulsa fair had the finest exhibit of corn that I have ever seen," Mr. Meyers continued. "We bought no show quality and type here while the corn exhibited at Wichita appeared to be taken spasmodically from the bins."
