

KRAMER IS PRESIDENT OF FAIR CORPORATION

Officers and Board of Directors for Half Million Dollar Exposition and Fair plant for Tulsa.

Announcement of the officers, directors and plans of the Tulsa Live Stock and Industrial exposition corporation was made yesterday afternoon by George H. Holcombe, secretary of the corporation.

Incorporated for \$500,000, the purpose of the organization is to erect and equip a monster fair and exposition that will be completed before the 1920 season. Plans have been drawn for an exposition which will be the largest of the kind in the state and will be equal to the Dallas exposition. Much attention has been attracted by a large architect's drawing in colors which has been placed in a store window at Boston and Third streets.

A large aviation field, a mile harness and auto track a 7-8 mile running track, a concrete grandstand with seating capacity of 15,000 people with bleachers and a large swimming pool are some of the features of the exposition, which will also serve the purpose of an all-year playground and amusement park. Planned plans also contemplate a dancing pavilion, skating rink, athletic fields, amphitheater, children's playground, boy scout's camp, a fine fire and education building, and all other exposition features that are found in the most modern fairs.

Several locations for the exposition are being considered and a committee has been appointed to recommend possible sites to be acted upon by the directors at a meeting next week.


Krieger on Way Home.

Seminole Plan Memorial for John F. Brown, the Last Chief

A movement has been launched by leading Seminole Indians of southeastern Oklahoma to establish a memorial to the late John F. Brown, last chief of the Seminole nation, who passed on October 21, this year, at his home at Sasakwa, in Seminole county.

It is possible that the memorial may be in the form of making the Brown residence there a museum so that everyone may benefit by the gifts of the five civilized tribes, has produced.

Dr. C. P. Linn of Tulsa, was for many years personal physician to Chief Brown, and when John F. Brown was stricken in his last illness, Doctor Linn was summoned and was with him when he "went west."

A history of Chief Brown was written by J. W. Keiff in 1907, the year that the territories of Indian and Oklahoma were merged into the forty-sixth state of the federal union.

John F. Brown was born near Tallapoosa, in the Cherokee nation, on October 23, 1841, and was 77 years old when he died. His father was Dr. John F. Brown, an army surgeon who accompanied the Seminoles from Florida into the Indian territory. He agreed and won a full-blood Seminole girl, but there being a provision in the Seminole code preventing intermarriage with whites, Doctor Brown took his prospective bride into the Cherokee nation where they were married, reared a family and spent the remainder of his life in the picturesque Cherokee country. When the war between the states threatened, he drifted south, locating in the Seminole nation at Sasakwa. With the southern states seceding, and the United States army moving against the Seminoles, he showed he could be a lieutenant. He arrived in the First Creek regiment under Colonel D. N. McIntosh. The war over, he was selected by the people to represent them in the first annual conference of 1886 when a treaty was made between the government and the Indians, which re-established peace.

The Vewoka Capital-Democrat said:

Soon after Jumper and John Chumco had been gathered to the land of their fathers, John Brown was called upon to administer the affairs of state for the Seminoles. He was principal chief, continuing since his first election, except for one term held by Hualbitta Micco.

"When the war between the states (the Freedmen called it the war of freedom), and the Indians the war between brothers broke out, John Jumper went with the southern cause, while John Chumco headed the band of 'Loyal Seminoles' who fought with the union John Brown was a southern sympathizer and saw service in the Confederate army. After the war was over Jumper and Chumco ruled the Seminoles jointly. John Chumco survived Jumper and after his death John F. Brown was chosen as chief by the Seminoles. As governor of the Seminoles his judgment was highly prized and sought after by the government officials at Washington. Governor Brown ruled many of the great men of the United States as his personal friends.

Among these were Presidents Cleveland, McKinley and Roosevelt. He maintained his own church near his home where he went each Sunday to preach the Gospel of Christ to his people. Governor Brown has lived greatly indeed, for record will bear the full light of day from the beginning to its close. He believed that whatever made men good Christians made them good citizens.

He was instrumental in getting what is now the Rock Island railroad through Vewoka, and through his untiring efforts the Vewoka was induced to build its line through this portion of the Indian territory. It was through his efforts that the two great Seminole schools, Tusahoka and Mekosawee, were established by the government in the Seminole nation. He endeavored to give the young Seminoles every advantage of education, so that they might better meet the risks of life which he knew was coming with the advent of the white man and his ways.

With the death of Governor Brown passes the last member of that great Seminole tribe, the Seminoles, who were the last of the Seminoles to live in the Seminole nation. The Seminoles lose their greatest and best friend."
