

PENN WINS FROM CORNELL ELEVEN

Quakers Play Brilliant Football In All Departments.

CORNELL IS HELPLESS

Ithacans Unable to Check Penn Attack—Cornell Unable to Score.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 27.—The University of Pennsylvania football team closed the season today with a brilliant victory over Cornell in their annual Thanksgiving day game, 24 to 0.

The Quakers showed superiority over Cornell in every department of the game, and their goal line was never in danger of being crossed by the Ithacans.

The first period when Pennsylvania had worked the ball to one yard from the Cornell goal. The Quakers, having had an easy time pushing the pigskin along, tried four times to carry it across, but Cornell's line held their opponents for downs.

Pennsylvania's first touchdown came in the second period when she scored on a forward pass, sent to Hopper, inside Cornell's 10-yard line.

Three points were added in the third period on a touchdown by Light and a field goal by Brunner.

The gift, which is the largest made by the board for this or any other purpose, comes from its general funds, the announcement says and not out of John D. Rockefeller's recent donation of \$2,500,000 for the promotion of medical education in the United States.

TIGERS 13, KANSAS 6

Missouri Triumphs Over Jayhawkers and Wins Missouri Valley Conference Title.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Nov. 27.—The Missouri football team defeated the University of Kansas eleven here today 13 to 6 in the Missouri Valley conference title. It was Missouri's eighth victory over Kansas in 27 years.

Missouri's first score came in the second period when "Chuck" Lewis carried the ball over for a touchdown, after Kansas had thrown back two Missouri charges on the own two-yard line.

Kansas' six points were made in the last two minutes of play after Lewis had attempted and failed six times to dropkick. His last attempt was blocked and captain Bassett of Kansas rushed in, kicked the oval several times and recovered it at Missouri's 25-yard line.

A penalty cost Missouri a touchdown in the final period. After Lewis had attempted his fourth dropkick and failed, Peterson intercepted Pringle's pass and it was Missouri's ball on Kansas' 30-yard line. Lewis made five yards around left end. When Lewis fumbled the ball and recovered it, Lasslett threw him for a 17-yard loss.
