

### GLASS PLANTS TO OPEN NEW YEAR'S

Workers Given Raise of 5 Per Cent in Pay, By Operators.

### EFFECTS FIVE STATES

Conference of Strikers and Operators Successful, So Word from Ohio Says.

ST. SMITH, Ark., Nov. 27.—Wind glass plants in the southeastern district, composed of Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas and Louisiana, after a suspension since last spring will resume work on January 1, it was announced today. The men will receive an increase in wages of five per cent. The decision was reached at a conference of the glass workers and operators at Cleveland, Ohio, today.

### FOR CITY MANAGER Negro Who Bit Old Man, Causing Death, To Live in Asylum

### Negro Who Bit Old Man, Causing Death, To Live in Asylum

The negro, of powerful physique, has heretofore been involved in several fights with both white and black men, but the hardest blows have had to effect upon him, a heavy blow across the head by a two-inch pipe of lead pipe in the hands of a plumber having failed to stagger him.

### SMITH FUND IS CHARGED

Older Chairman Says Republicans Are Amassing 1920 Funds. WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Charles H. Smith, chairman of the 1920 campaign, that may total \$100,000,000, was made today by W. W. Burton, state chairman of the Ohio democratic executive committee. In an open letter to Chairman Hon. R. B. Smith, of the democratic national committee, Burton declared that J. H. Dean, J. K. Leland and Fred A. Coyle of Cleveland had advertised contributing \$1,000 each to a preliminary republican campaign fund.

### CHRISTMAS SEAL SUNDAY

Gov. Robertson Asks Oklahomans to Pray for the Sick. OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 27.—A proclamation setting aside Sunday, November 30, as a day of prayer for those afflicted with tuberculosis, has been issued by Governor Robertson. The governor asks the citizens of the state to devote a part of their services to the fight

being waged against tuberculosis in the state, and asks that prayers be given in the homes and churches. The day has been termed "Christmas seal Sunday" by the governor in his proclamation.

### HARRIELD HAS TONSILLITIS

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


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
