

### PRISONERS BEAT UP SAPULPA COP

Two Men Had Attempted to Keep Negroes Off Street Car

### HENSEL BADLY HURT

On Way To Station One of Men Grabbed Officer's Police Club.

**SAPULPA, Nov. 29.**—E. E. Hensel, a night desk sergeant of the police department, is today confined to his bed suffering from severe injuries and in getting the possible loss of the sight of one eye as a result of an attack made upon him near midnight last night. He had arrested "Runt" Williams and Carl Lane for alleged molesting of street car passengers. The two men, it is said today, were attempting to prevent Hensel from boarding a street car in the downtown section when Hensel on his way to work intercepted and placed Williams under arrest. As he and his prisoner started in the direction of the police station Lane followed and when the trio reached a point near an alley within a half a block of the station one of the men seized Hensel's right arm from his hand and struck him a blow, knocking him to the sidewalk.

According to a lone witness to the fight, the man after knocking Hensel to the sidewalk kicked him many times about the body and head, after dragging him into the alley entrance where he was left bleeding as they fled. A cold drizzle pelted to some extent the injured officer and he was able to make his way to the station and report. Other officers soon had the escaped assaulters in custody. Today they were turned over to the county on a charge of assault with intent to do great bodily harm. In their arraignment before Justice George Jennings this afternoon they pleaded not guilty and bond in each case was set at \$10,000, which neither could furnish.

Hensel will probably be removed to a Tulsa hospital tomorrow. Besides many cuts and bruises, his right eye was completely ruptured by the assaulters.



