

STRIKE WILL END; TERMS WITHHELD

Settlement Conditions Are Mystery to Both Factions.

CAPITAL IS SILENT

Contempt Proceedings to Continue Against Union Men.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 7.—

Government officials and representatives of the United Mine Workers of America professed ignorance tonight of the terms of the proposed settlement of the strike of coal miners of the country, agreed upon last night in Washington by officials of the miners' union and Attorney General Palmer and Joseph Tumulty, the president's secretary.

Henry B. Mitchell, special assistant to Mr. Palmer, who is in Indianapolis to assist the United States district attorney in the investigation of alleged violations of the Lever and anti-trust laws, said that he had received no advice from Washington since the conference last night. He would venture no opinion as to whether the contempt proceedings against heads of the miners' union would be dismissed or postponed.

Attorneys for the miners said they had no idea as to the proposal made in Washington and that they could not predict what effect the agreement would have on the court proceedings here.

Miners Look to Lewis. Edlin Searles, editor of the United Mine Workers Journal, would only re-iterate his statement of early this morning, that whatever proposal had proved acceptable to Acting President John L. Lewis and Secretary and Treasurer William Green in Washington would be endorsed by the executive board of the miners when it meets here Tuesday. Mr. Searles said that Mr. Lewis and Mr. Green were not expected to reach Indianapolis before tomorrow morning, and that in the meantime miners' officials here expected no information on the Washington agreement.

A special session of the federal grand jury is scheduled to start tomorrow morning to take charges of conspiracy on the part of miners and operators to limit the production of coal. Action against the coal men will be sought under both the Lever and anti-trust acts, and according to attorneys for the government, the investigation will extend to every section of the country in which bituminous coal miners are on strike. According to government attorneys, they have evidence that the operators not only have conspired with the miners in violation of government statutes, but that they have formed a combination of operators alone, intended to limit the production of coal.

The operators have declared that they welcome an investigation of the charges against them, asserting that such a probe will prove the inaccuracy of allegations that they have joined a conspiracy to limit coal production. Miners' officials have remained silent with regard to the approaching investigation.

The contempt charges set for Tuesday morning were brought on information charging the miners' officials had violated the injunction issued here by United States District Judge A. B. Anderson against any encouragement of the strike. Eighty-four international or district officials of the mine workers are involved in the case, and in addition specific charges of violation of the injunction by payment of strike benefits have been instituted against 13 officials of two local unions of Clinton, Ind.

THREE COURTS VERY BUSY

Judges Owen and Martin to Try Civil Cases—Federal Court Continues.

Civil jury dockets begin this morning in both district and superior courts. Judge Owen Owen in the former having set sufficient cases for a continuous session until February 1. Judge L. J. Martin of superior court will probably dismiss his jury before Christmas.

The civil docket in both courts are congested, but with the completion of two district court rooms, allowing both Judges Owen and H. E. Cole to hold simultaneous sessions, the matter before the district court will be handled with more dispatch. Judge Cole will return to Tulsa from Lawrence, where he is now holding court, to begin a criminal docket extending over four weeks in district court.

The record of the district court for the past year has shown disposition of double the number of civil and three times the number of criminal cases over any like period in the history of Tulsa county. Judge Cole set 50 criminal sessions for almost five months out of the past eleven months, the trials or pleas of guilty to felonies resulting in the sentences of more than 25 men and one woman to the penitentiary.

In the United States district court Judge H. L. Williams will order the trial started of the government versus As. S. Koonce and J. E. Leach, charged with sending immoral matter through the mails.

had no sweetheart that I know of." Whether I was ever loved or never loved by any woman but his sister. The warden exhibited a \$50 Liberty bond and \$75 worth of thrift stamps that the man had brought with him from the penitentiary. He said that Carlisle had bought bonds and stamps and that the warden denied the rumor that Carlisle had bought bonds and stamps for soldiers during the war. "Carlisle can't buy a bond or a stamp," he said. "He tried once, but because he encouraged when he dropped too many stitches."

On his return Brine experts Carlisle to be the same model prisoner as before. He says he will probably get out again, if he can and will undoubtedly rob the first convenient train after he gets out. His nature has not changed. There is no sorrow in his soul for his crimes. In fact he doesn't really seem to appreciate the seriousness of his offenses. Brine believes "He has the courage of a man and the mind of a child."

Henry B. Brine says "He is by instinct a criminal with a mania for holding up Union Pacific trains. He has four to his credit now. When a boy he was sent to reform school at various times and came to Wyoming from the Montana penitentiary where he had served six years for robbery."

"When he gets back we are going to try to keep him here," Brine says. "The stripes and the 'hole' will not be the train robbers lot on his return to the prison, says the warden. That is unless he surprises everyone by becoming amiable. He will be treated as before but watched with greater care."

"When the prison life becomes stale and unprofitable again, he is expected to make another try for freedom. And if it is successful, there will be more claims against the Union Pacific for money and valuables lost through a train robbery."

ESTABLISH FREE CLINIC

She has been taking children for free treatment to Dr. Woods for some time but the number grew so large that it was necessary to establish a clinic to meet the situation.

Doctor O'Dell Tells How Strength May Best be Developed.

"We shouldn't pray to escape the storms," he said, "but rather that we should have a calm within our souls while going through the storms and thus receive the benefit in strength of character as a result."

Doctor O'Dell spoke of the many storms recorded on the Sea of Galilee during the time of Jesus, and how his disciples often suffered through lack of faith. He said we must hold our faith always in time of stress and strain, and so make it possible to successfully weather the storms.

"We cannot afford to expend all our energy in fighting our way against the difficulties of life," said Doctor O'Dell, "or we will find that after the storm is past and calm is restored, we are just where we started. We must somehow rise above them, if we are to give our souls a chance to grow and spend our lives unselfishly."


