

CITY IS TO REVISE STREET NAMES

Mayor and Commissioners Approve Steps for an Early Action.

Revision of the names and numbers of the city streets will be undertaken by the city at once, according to Mayor C. H. Hubbard at the meeting of the board of city commissioners Tuesday. After the discussion of the project by the commissioners, the mayor instructed M. J. McNulty, commissioner of streets and public property, to present a recommendation on the matter to the commissioners at their meeting Friday, when definite action will be taken.

"This revision of streets and numbers should be accomplished at once," said Mayor Hubbard, who introduced the matter at the meeting.

The longer it is put off the more expensive it will be both in time and money," he said, referring to an article on the subject which appeared in The Sunday World.

Numerous instances were cited by the commissioners of duplication of the names of streets in all parts of the city. Irregularly, street numbers were represented as being equally confusing. Commissioner H. E. Curran of the water department declared that the loss of time caused the employees of the water department alone, on account of lack of a standard system of street numbers and names, would run into several hundred dollars a month.

H. Terwilliger, chairman of the committee on city improvement of the real estate exchange, discussed the matter at the meeting and urged that speedy action be taken to have the streets of the city standardized. Commissioner McNulty said that the matter had been called to his attention by W. A. O'Brien, chief clerk of the building inspection department, and said that he would present a recommendation of the matter at the next meeting.

Owing to his intimate knowledge of all parts of the city, Mr. O'Brien was suggested by Mayor Hubbard as the man to take charge of the work of the street revision.

VERDICT IS INCREASED

Sent Back By Judge. Second Decision Trebles Award to Judge Oliphant in Superior Court.

Verdict for \$1,487 in favor of the plaintiff was returned by the jury in superior court Tuesday morning. In the suit of A. G. Oliphant against John W. Mitchell and G. T. Williams, son. The jury after bringing in the verdict for \$1,600, Monday night, had been returned to the jury room

later with further instructions from the court.

Oliphant asked judgment for \$1,487, the amount he paid into the defendants in 1888, for shares of stock in the now defunct Merchants & Planters Fire Insurance Co. He also asked \$1,600 as attorney fees and compensation for work performed for the company of which the defendants were officers. The company, shortly after payment was made by Oliphant, was thrown into the hands of a receiver and the plaintiff was unlawfully deprived according to his petition, of the money and services rendered the defendants.
