

WANTS BIG FIGHT AT DEWEY JULY 4

Bartlesville Man Makes
Offer to Manager of
Dempsey.

COCHRAN IS IN GOTHAM

British Promotor Arrives to
Submit Proposal for Bat-
tle With Carpenter.

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., Dec. 25.—George C. Galloway, local fight promoter, received a telegram to-day from Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, expressing a desire to consider Galloway's proposition of offering a purse of \$150,000 for a fight between Dempsey and Carpenter at Dewey, Okla., in open air arena next July 4. The suggestion also included the moving picture rights of a picture to be taken at Pershing, a new oil town in Osage county, Oklahoma. Kearns expressed a willingness to go over all details of both propositions with Mr. Galloway. It is understood Galloway has the financial backing of local oil men.

COCHRAN, BRITISH PROMOTOR HERE.
NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—C. B. Cochran, British fight promoter, arrived here today on the steamer Mauretania, prepared to offer a substantial sum for staging a world's heavyweight boxing championship match between Georges Carpentier, champion of Europe, and Jack Dempsey, holder of the world's heavyweight belt.

Mr. Cochran is on his way to see Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager. Although he prepared to give details of his plans, he intimated that he had made tentative arrangements for the bout in either France or Great Britain, where it would be permitted to go a sufficient number of rounds to show the mettle of both men.

Carpentier, he said, would have the solid backing of a large number of the French and English fight followers, because of his easy defeat of the English champion, Beckett. No matter where a Carpentier-Dempsey fight was held it would be assured of a capacity attendance, he added.

4 CONFERENCE GAMES

Sooners Eleven Assured of A-1 Opponents During the 1920 Fall Season.

NORMAN, Dec. 25.—The recent admission of the University of Oklahoma to the Missouri Valley conference places four conference games on the Sooners' 1920 football schedule, tentatively arranged at a meeting of Missouri Valley directors at Kansas City.

The University of Kansas eleven and the Kansas Aggies will come to Norman next season, while Oklahoma will tackle the University of Missouri at Columbia and Washington university at St. Louis. Two other games will be staged at Norman, the University of Arkansas playing there in the opening contest of the Oklahoma season and the Oklahoma Aggies being listed for November 13.

FIGHTERS AT WORK

Sport Fans Say Saturday Scrap to Be Best Middleweight Card Yet Given Here.

Interest in the 10-round boxing match between Young Fitzsimmons of Oklahoma City and Harry Krohn of Akron, Ohio, at the Grand Athletic club Saturday night is growing since both middleweights started actual training at the gymnasium that has been established in the rear of Central fire station.

A good sized crowd gathered there yesterday to watch both men work out, and seeing them in action caused more than one to remark that Krohn and Fitzsimmons are ideal middleweights in height, weight, reach and sparring attributes.

Both men have commendable records behind them, and they are training hard for the scrap, which promises to be a stepping stone for one or both to later meet Mike O'Dowd, the champion. This work consists of early morning runs on the roads near Tulsa and boxing at the gymnasium with local talent.

The three preliminaries of Saturday's card are to be above the average. Andy Switzer, the fighting fireman, meets Clint Daniels, Smith Barnes, Cosden featherweight, and Kid Porter will go six rounds and a four-round curtain raiser completes the program.

CHICAGO, Dec. 25.—Grover Cleveland Alexander, star pitcher of the Chicago National league team, has accepted a place as coach of the University of Illinois football team and will spend several weeks adding the college boys, who aspire to pitching next spring.
