

DAUGHTER NAMED AS BENEFICIARY

Coyne Estate of \$70,000 Awarded to His Long Lost Daughter.

MISSING THIRTY YEARS

Claim of Mrs. Mary Hilton Is Sustained by the Court.

Making an order that the missing daughter of the deceased should inherit the entire fortune of \$70,000 left by her father, the probate judge yesterday sustained the claim of Mrs. Mary Hilton to the estate of her father, Patrick E. Coyne, former Tulsa real estate man, who died in Mineral Wells, Texas, in April, 1917.

After a diligent search for the daughter for two years, the court was unable to get any trace of her. The estate was in part divided and the other relatives of the deceased. Three months ago the daughter was located and her attorney at once set up a claim was already made by Judge W. B. Williams in county court yesterday.

Coyne and his wife were separated in Ireland when Mrs. Hilton came to America, the child remaining in Ireland with her grandmother. At the age of 16 years, the daughter came to this country and found her mother living in St. Louis. The daughter, however, did not remain with her mother, and she has never been able to find her father though he lives in eastern Oklahoma for many years.

WOULD RAISE THE LEVY

Teachers Unanimous in Favoring to Mills to Conduct Schools of State.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 5.—An amendment to the state constitution providing for the raising of a levy of from six to 19 mills for school purposes was drafted here by a committee of the Oklahoma Educational association. After presentation to the state convention of the teachers association here on February 19, it is expected that petitions will be circulated calling for an action on the proposed amendment.

The committee planned a program for the convention which includes William H. Taft, former president as a speaker. It is believed that the election desired will be held at the time of the regular election in November. The amendment provides that oil companies must pay the tax over and above the gross production tax. R. H. Wilson, state superintendent, stated today that some such amendment is imperative in Oklahoma if the schools are to continue operation. The committee which prepared the amendment at a meeting at the capitol this morning was composed of representatives of each of the district teachers organizations of the state.

AND THEN IT HAPPENED

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 5.—"Everything in fine shape," said Claude Connally, state labor commissioner. Then came three telegrams stating that three strikes are already under way in the state. R. L. Carroll, mayor of Muskogee, asked for help in a strike of laborers at that point. Concrete workers on city and private work have struck for \$7 per day and common laborers want \$4. The scale has been \$2 and \$3. The barbers of Ardmore and the printers at Muskogee are the remaining strikers.

GLASS PLANTS RESUME

Four Shifts of 6 Hours Each Inaugurated at Factories in Okmulgee.

Five hundred men went to work this morning, working 24 hours daily in four 6-hour shifts. The weekly payroll of both factories is above \$30,000. Verdict for Defendant in Damage Suit Against Hotel Owner

Sustaining a demurrer to the plaintiff's testimony in the damage suit of Myrtle Bourde against E. L. Fox, proprietor of the New Fox hotel, in which judgment for \$5,000 was asked, the case was taken from the jury in district court No. 1 yesterday. Judgment awarded to the defendant.

Mrs. Bourde, a roomer in the hotel in May of 1918, stated in her petition that a section of plaster fell from the ceiling of the room she occupied striking her on the head. Her injuries she asked damages of \$5,000.

Mail Carrier Pleads Guilty

Raymond O. Holson, mail carrier in the local office, was admitted to bail of \$500 yesterday at his arraignment before C. L. Yancy, United States commissioner, on the charge of the embezzlement of postoffice mail matter. Holson pleaded guilty to taking a letter from the mails and extracting a silk handkerchief, which was later found by O. C. Pierce, local postoffice inspector.

Collegiate Alumnae Will Encourage Study of English.

IS FIGHTING LIVING COST

Whitehurst Would Have Refrigerators Delivered Milk and Eggs.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 5.—J. A. Whitehurst, president of the state board of agriculture, has thrown down the gauntlet to the living cost of milk and eggs. He has a plan to cut the costs from under the high cost of milk, eggs and butter.

Mr. Whitehurst suggests that refrigerator cars be used in the state an express carriers to deliver supplies of milk, butter and eggs direct from the producer to consuming centers.

Under the present distribution, he says, a large part of these products are spoiled for human consumption on account of transit delays.

Circulate Pardon Petition.

CONRAD HOFFMAN IS TO SPEAK HERE

Has Great Story to Tell of the War Behind the Scenes.

The committee in charge of the Tulsa Forum has made a great step in securing its speaker on Monday, January 13, Conrad Hoffman, one of the few Americans who remained in German territory throughout the war who worked along the entire frontiers held in Germany until America's entrance into the conflict when he devoted himself to the needs of our men in the prison camps and who did not return to America until June of last year.

The great story of the war behind the scenes, the attitude of the allied governments against their own soldiers dispatched in Germany, those 60,000 worth of condemned men that had been secured was not allowed to be distributed among our own men in the prison camps, the spirit of the German people versus the German rulers, what it means to live on bread for 10 weeks, rationing a nation's winter food, these are some of the thrilling things that Mr. Hoffman will have to tell.

Hoffman was one of eight men sent abroad by Dr. John H. Mott in 1915 to visit the warring nations as friendly counselors. Arriving in England these men found conditions such that they decided to devote their lives to the cause of the world's peace, the others slaying with the sword, Mr. Hoffman went to Germany, where living in Berlin, he was given the freedom of the Prussian Empire, membership of congresses, Rotary clubs and religious bodies throughout the country to address them on his experiences.
