## OPEN SHOP VOTED IN TULSA CLUB

### Tulsa Salesmen Endorse Movement to Bar the Unions in City.

The open shop was advocated by the members of the Tulsa club, an organization of salesmen, at a banquet yesterday in the Hotel Tulsa. E. M. Gallagher, a lawyer, was the principal speaker. The club is a purely voluntary organization and its members voted on record in favor of the declaration of leading Tulsa employers yesterday in favor of barring the union organizers in Tulsa which are said to be the highest paid wages in their line of any in America.

"Labor is great only so far as it is free," said Mr. Gallagher, "and it is free only so far as it is free from the individual's choice. I do not believe that any class of men can say to you or to me 'you do not do this or you do not do that.' Not if this is a democracy."

"There is a motive power behind every one of us. Every nation and every individual is controlled by a philosophy and the world is now in a turmoil because of this philosophy. Salesmen are American vandals. They have their hand on the pulse of the nation. This country is our country and no man has any right to take it away from us. The majority shall rule."

"I am for this country and this country alone. The man who is against this country is my enemy."

### Negro Girl Accused of Attacking Child in Pending Action of Justice Mayes.

No decision was made yesterday in the prosecution of the case of the Negro girl accused of attacking the child of Justice Mayes. The case will be held over until the next day.

The girl, who is 12 years old, was arrested on the night of December 12, while her parents were away from home. A woman neighbor, Mrs. J. H. Mayes, attacked the girl with a brick and struck her on the head and shoulder.

Proof showed yesterday that the girl saw the negro's hand and that the assailant was a woman, was a white woman with long hair, wearing a blue dress and a white apron. The girl was accused of attacking the child of Justice Mayes.
