

## MISS MORGAN IS QUEEN OF TULSA

Chamber of Commerce bows a hearty greeting to "Our Visitor."

### SPEAKS OF HERITAGE

Man Power and Raw Material Constitute Wealth, Noted Banker's Daughter Says.

Wealth consists of man power and raw material, declared Miss Anne Morgan, in her way of greeting to the directors of the Chamber of commerce yesterday noon.

"France has 25 per cent of her land, consequently as much raw material, she had 67 per cent of human power between the ages of 25 and 45, the cream of the country. Of the men from 18 to 45, or military age, we see daily, she has 15 per cent. Now, we are told by our government, the condition of France is the best conditions in France that France has plenty of natural, plenty of men. We are told by informed persons that France will be independent of huge pronouncements."

"France may get some indemnity, but that will not be available for at least two years; none of it France is torn, bleeding in the devastated regions. To the American committee for devasted France, we have turned over 100 shares. These shares had a population of 50,000 before the war. Now they have 17,000. Outside of one or two very small organizations, the American committee for devasted France is caring for all of the French people unable to be tended to by the French government."

Special attention is devoted Miss Morgan upon her arrival when she went immediately to luncheon with the directors of the chamber of commerce in the Hotel Tulsa. Unusually attentive were the directors toward Miss Morgan's talk on her reasons for coming at this time to secure in Tulsa a part of the \$1,000,000 being raised by the American committee for devasted France.

W. E. Brown of the Tulsa advertising house, associated in introducing Miss Morgan, and E. H. Griggs made a speech. J. F. McElveen, president of the Tulsa Traffic association, offered the assistance of that body in any matters the chamber might have for the benefit of Tulsa. The directors were urged to aid in every possible way the taking of the official census.

Refusing the property was Mrs. Jessie Davis, who testified that son of the defendant came into the store several days later wearing a shirt similar to the one lay by the negro.

Mrs. Jessie claimed she bought the shirt for her son, and that she made the purchase several days before the alleged theft.

"It is absolutely fantastic for any American to think the upholding of France is not our job," said Miss Anne Morgan yesterday afternoon at the Hotel Tulsa, following the announcement upon her made for devastated France before the chamber of commerce at their noon luncheon.

She was not resting on the sofa. Women were having a luncheon after an interview with an association but was constantly answering questions propounded to her by Mrs. Binney, the chairman of the south western district of the American committee, and telling her secretary at intervals just what do, even answering the phone herself when it rang. Miss Morgan would turn a smiling face toward her visitor, and continue her talk without any seeming lapse. She seems to be one who can think of three things or more at once and double on all of them at the same time and with it all is a great radiating personality without nerves.

She comes to Tulsa, she stated because she knows of the great oil metropolis and knows of its reputation of doing things on a mammoth scale; of its wonderful potentiality. Her face glowed when she said: "I was given a strenuous resolution to do my best to overcome. I really think Tulsa's spirit is fine, and I am optimistic over the result of our visit here."
