

BOND ISSUE FOR SCHOOL SYSTEM

Citizens' Committee Reports \$850,000 Must Be Voted Soon.

SUGGEST FEBRUARY 17

Salary Increase and Bonus for Teachers Imperative; Ask 15-Mill Levy.

An \$850,000 bond issue for buildings and equipment. A 15 mill levy for teachers next year.

A \$125 bonus to teachers for this year if funds can be provided. A 15 mill levy.

These were the four recommendations made by the members of the citizens committee at their final meeting in the high school last night.

"We have noted the policy of the board of education in time of emergency to put up temporary rooms but these are in no wise rooms fit for regular school work year after year."

"We noted in the Collins Clinton district there are 12 temporary buildings in use, and in the Washington district the junior high school has outgrown its facilities."

"We noted that the Irving district has a very great need for additional playground space. We noted, likewise, that in almost every district of the city there is a shortage of rooms."

"Estimating the immediate needs for next year the board of education should have 100 additional rooms to release one-half of the temporary structures and 50 additional rooms if any of the temporary structures are not released."

"Besides the needs for additional rooms in the grades it is regretted that the new high school building should become crowded and that pupils should be denied the privilege of having work in physical education because there are not facilities. Likewise that pupils should be crowded into small rooms and that teachers should not have sufficient classrooms to meet the pupils in. This condition, together with the fact that it will be at least one year before the new addition to the high school can be completed makes it imperative that we urged immediate action in completing the proposed addition to the new high school. After careful consideration the needs for new buildings your committee has concluded to recommend the following schedule as meeting the most urgent needs:

Collins Clinton, rooms and auditorium, \$10,000; high school, addition, \$125,000; Irving school, additional site and buildings, \$45,000; Jefferson auditorium, \$30,000; Mark Twain, buildings, \$15,000; Washington, high school, addition, \$60,000; equipment, \$100,000; new sites, \$30,000; total, \$850,000.

"We recommend further that the board take immediate steps in calling a bond issue sufficient to raise the funds and that the proposed buildings be constructed when the funds are available."

Democrats discussed generally their line of procedure and it was tentatively decided in the event of utter failure of the conference to-morrow to present to the senate modifications to the treaty agreed upon by democrats and insist upon a vote.

outlined in his testimony were devoted to explaining the soviet system to the end that the americans would allow its recognition as the established government in Russia, and were not to extend it in the United States.

When the committee demanded copies of the actual governmental instructions to that effect, former Senator Hardwick of Georgia, attorney for the soviet bureau, argued that to give them might disclose the "code" in which the soviet foreign office corresponded with Martens, which should be entitled to immunity, but promised to furnish them in the original or in sworn translations. An adjournment was taken until Thursday partly to let Martens examine his records for that purpose.

He has the right to evict the land. The state of Texas holds one-eighth interest in any oil which may be obtained therefrom.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 26.—Request for troops to guard Oklahoma's interests on the Red river border made to the governor today by A. M. Stewart of Grandfield, former member of the supreme court commission, will not be granted unless further over act on the part of Texas makes it necessary, Governor Ross said this afternoon.

Stewart's telegram follows: "Bark Divide oil property in main channel of Red river has well over-flowing with oil and has been under guard of deputy sheriffs of Tillamook county under orders of the district court. Without court order 27 armed men under Adjutant General Cope of Texas demanded possession of A. M. Stewart of Grandfield, oil oil demanded by French articles who was on the ground. Arrangement was made for all men to take care of property. Our men will not yield. Unless your government orders us to preserve order and the recognized sovereignty of Oklahoma, bloodshed."

Besides entering his denial of charges that he had participated in financing revolutionary activities in the United States, the witness said he was spending \$20,500 a week on the maintenance of an organization of some 25 employees. He gave the committee names and addresses of all of them, including American clerks and stenographers and press agents. The money expended came from Russia, he testified, in the form of paper currency of Finland, Sweden and other neighboring states. Besides publishing a weekly magazine, "Soviet Russia," the soviet bureau, he said, maintained an editorial department designed to help Russians get technical education in the United States which would be useful to the soviet government when those persons returned, and were in a position to give technical department to employ experts to assemble data for use in the state-operated industries, a legal department to advise him and other Russians and a medical department also designed to get Russia competent practitioners and surgeons.

Senator Borah inquired as to the "Soviet Russia" publication's mail address. He was told that it was that Postmaster General Borah had never objected to its circulation, the senator remarked grimly amidst laughter that "it must be all right."

BOSTON SHOE MEN FINED

Charged With Profiteering in Operating Chain of Stores.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Jan. 26. Three Boston men who operate a chain of shoe stores in New England cities were fined \$1,000 each today and their local managers \$100 on the charge of profiteering. The men, who pleaded nolo in the United States court here, are Samuel F. Plamondon, A. Collins and G. M. Goldsmith, all of Boston, and Joseph Freedburg, the local manager. According to the government, the men bought some shoes as low as \$1.25 a pair and sold them for more than \$3. It was said seven customers were given 20 per cent of all money received above the regular price and that in one month these men made \$14 in commissions. The firm was alleged to have done business totaling \$10,000 in one month, of which \$2,900 was profit.
