

DOYLE ACCUSED OF AUTO THEFT

Justice Gray Holds Defendant After Freeing Friends.

STOLEN CAR WRECKED

After Car Was Hit by Train Doyle Filed Claim With Railroad.

Tom Doyle, charged with the larceny of an automobile in this city January 19, the property of L. J. Leskowitz, was held for trial before Justice H. J. Gray at his preliminary hearing yesterday before Justice H. J. Gray and was committed to jail under bond of \$2,500 to await trial. Doyle was charged jointly with Leroy Ward, charged with the larceny of the automobile, the court holding that he was a passenger in the stolen car, which was in possession of Doyle. Evidence in the case showed that Doyle was questioned by police officers at Sapulpa immediately after a Ford sedan in which they were riding near Kelseyville was wrecked by a train on January 20. Later the youths filed a claim for damages against the railroad, and were later arrested for theft of the car. Ward proved that he was indicted by Doyle to take a hunting trip, going from Sapulpa south toward Kelseyville where the car was wrecked at a grade crossing.

STOLEN SUGAR

Grever Crews Held for Trial, Though Denying Charge at Hearing

Grever Crews, arrested Saturday in the charge of receiving 10 sacks of stolen sugar, entered a plea of guilty yesterday at his arraignment before Justice H. J. Gray and was committed to jail under bond of \$100 for preliminary trial February 18. Crews, who operates a restaurant near the Midland Valley depot, was arrested by W. T. Kithart, deputy sheriff, when it became known that the defendant had stored nine sacks of sugar with L. R. Quinn, northeast of the city. The sugar was identified as property stolen from the railroad, Quinn and Sheriff Woolley. Crews was asked that Quinn store the sugar for the restaurant proprietor, and that he did so out of friendship for Crews, with no knowledge that the sugar was stolen property.

IS ACCUSED OF ROBBERY

Ed Berry Said to Have Robbed Two Greeks at Midland Valley.

Ed Berry, charged with conjoint robbery of Theodore Stevenson and Steve Gabriel on the night of August 11, was committed to jail yesterday at the close of his preliminary hearing before Justice H. J. Gray, for trial before district court. The complainants, Greeks employed at a local cafe, testified that they were robbed by two young men at the Midland Valley railroad tracks at the Second street crossing. Later, they recognized Berry as he sat at the lunch counter in the cafe, and caused his arrest.
