

DELAY OPEN SHOP TRY LABOR COURT

Ponca City Chamber Will Give Kansas Plan a Work Out.

PONCA CITY, Feb. 8.—Under the plan of the local chamber of commerce an industrial court plan, patterned somewhat after Governor Henry Allen's experiment, is to be given a trial in this city, and its inauguration is to be immediate. The commission is to be composed of 12 to 15 men, will be named during the ensuing week and all rubs between employer and employee are to come before it.

This far in Ponca City, during the present stage of unrest throughout the entire country, there has been no strike. But there is a big building program in progress and to take care of this and also to protect building operations during the entire year, it was deemed best to provide a safeguard—therefore, the industrial commission plan.

The open shop had been discussed and was favored by the chamber of commerce. In fact the plan was given a unanimous vote by the members attending a smoker, following a discussion of various plans it was decided to give the industrial commission a trial, postponing the open shop for the time being. The building trades of this city, it is claimed, have come under the leadership of too radical men and a change in local conditions was deemed necessary in order to protect the welfare and growth of the city. The industrial commission will be made up of men, representing all interests, with contractors, business men and labor having members, and it is believed that all labor matters will be brought before the board for solution.

No campaign against unions as such has been made here and no protest against a high wage scale, but efficiency, an honest day's work and business judgment instead of radicalism are demanded. Over 400 men, of whom half were labor representatives, were at the smoker of the chamber of commerce when the industrial commission plan was voted and pledged themselves to give it a fair trial.

Geology Student of O. U. Criticizes Reports About Manana Republic.

NORMAN, Feb. 8.—All of Mexico is not a land where swagging bandits rush out from ambush and hold up trains. Neither do bandits rush into the main streets of Tampico with a revolver in one hand, a knife in his mouth, and a formal apology to the United States in the other hand for the outrage they are about to commit.

This is the word of Rolfe Engleman, geology student in the University of Oklahoma, who has just returned from Tampico, where he spent seven months in the service of a large oil company. He says colonies in Tampico are not districts occupied by various classes of foreigners, but refer to all Americans and all other nationalities there regardless of where they live. Tampico prices are about as high as in the United States, but food is cheaper in the interior, he says.
