

### FOOLS MOCK SIN BISHOP DECLARES

#### Is Like a Sharp Pointed Dagger Mouzon Says at Union Revival.

### FORGIVENESS POSSIBLE

#### God Will Forgive Evil Doer Who Asks It in Sincere Penitent Remorse.

**Bishop Mouzon Says:**

"A sense of sin is always an evidence of a deep spiritual nature. Indifference in reference to sin is always a characteristic of a superficial soul.

"No man can be a real man until he is afflicted with God.

"God is the source of the best things in life.

"Like a box car shoved by a switch engine, a man may run along awhile without God by his own momentum, but eventually he must stop.

"When a man separates himself from God, his character begins to decay.

"The forgiveness of sins is directly related to the death of Jesus Christ, who died that our sins might be forgiven.

"Fools make a mock of sin. They can't understand that it has a sharp-pointed dagger up its sleeve.

"You can't miss the consequences of sin by hiding your head like an ostrich and saying, 'for the consequences to blow over.'

"No man lives unto himself; no man dies unto himself." Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon said in his sermon at the Boston Avenue M. E. church last night.

"Man may believe he is the only one involved in his sin. But he is not. His wife, his family, his neighbors and his friends are involved. The father's sin may be visited upon his son; his effects may be so far-reaching that they draw his friends into it.

"Sin is a terrible thing. Yet some people do not regard it seriously.

"Can sin be forgiven? Some people say no. Emerson declares that once a sin is committed, it has left its marks; it is forever a sin, and for that reason cannot be forgiven.

"Others say sin can be forgiven. They declare that God is our heavenly Father, and that we are His children; that the loving father is always ready to forgive his children. 'Both are erroneous.

"You cannot expect to sin today, and then, in a brief and passing moment ask God to forgive you, and then go on your way tomorrow, confident that your sins have been forgiven.

"God will not forgive sins unless we ask in all sincerity that our sins be forgiven. It cost infinitely to make the forgiveness of sins possible. But thank God, sins may be forgiven."

Bishop Mouzon referred to the processes of nature as evidences of God's forgiveness. He told of a morning glory he plucked one morning which had been torn by the wind. Where the wound was healed, there was a deeper, truer purple color than on any other part of the flower.

"That, to me, was an evidence of God's way," he said.

Special services are to be held this morning and tonight.

That interest in the meetings is becoming greater was shown last night by those who came forward and by this action declared their intention of leading Christian lives.

### TO VISIT EX-SERVICE MEN

#### Vocational Education Man to Tour State to Aid Soldiers.

P. L. Long, head of the federal board for vocational education, and O. A. Ulrich, assistant, will leave tomorrow for a trip through eastern Oklahoma and western Arkansas, the district under the jurisdiction of the board, for the purpose of making contact with every ex-service man interested in and approved for vocational instruction.

The territory will be covered in about 15 days. Every county seat in the 30 counties is to be visited. Mr. Long will go to the northeastern part of Oklahoma and the northwestern part of Arkansas, and Mr. Ulrich to the southeastern part of Oklahoma and to the southwestern part of Arkansas.

There are about 700 men under the supervision of the federal vocational board in this district. The men are in schools, colleges, and business colleges and in placement training. Those in placement training are learning a wide variety of trades.

Applications for vocational training increase constantly in number, according to Mr. Long.

### TO HOLD ART EXHIBIT

#### Comprehensive Collection of Fine Paintings, Tapestries and Rare Porcelain Shows.

An important collection of paintings, tapestries and old Chinese porcelains will be on exhibition at Hotel Tulsa, room 512, commencing Monday, April 5. The collection comes from three of the most prominent firms in New York and is under the direction of Mrs. Quentin Mason.

The exhibit will be of great interest to art lovers as it comprises unusual portraits by Gainsborough, Hopner, Lawrence and other great masters of the 18th century English school, French paintings of Barbizon school, Dutch and modern American paintings, rare old Chinese porcelains and Italian brocades.

The tapestries are excellent examples of the French and Flemish weaving of the 17th and 18th centuries. This is the first time that an exhibition of such a comprehensive character and such artistic merit has been shown in Tulsa.

Mrs. Quentin Mason is the sister of Mrs. Cornelius H. Sage, distinguished director of the Albright Art gallery of Buffalo, N. Y., and was associated during the Panama Pacific International exposition with Monsieur Jean Guiffrey, French commissioner of fine arts, now director of painting at the Louvre, Paris.

### VACATION CAMP FOR OKLA. GIRLS

#### Plan Outing at Chautauqua Lake With Trips to Eastern Cities.

A summer camp for Oklahoma girls is to be established at Lake Chautauqua, New York, this summer. Mrs. A. W. Coleman of this city, who is secretary-treasurer of the camp organization, announced last week.


Mather hall, an estate of 160 acres on the shores of Lake Chautauqua, will be the setting for the camp. The estate belongs to Irvin T. Mather, president of Oswego college for girls at Oswego, Kan. Mather hall itself will accommodate 50 girls in addition to chaquesons, a house-keeper and servants. Means of transportation to the camp is provided in motor and row boats and a camp motor car.

Oklahoma girls who register for the camp will leave this state on a special June 15. From Chicago they will take a boat trip through the Great Lakes to Buffalo, N. Y., which is several hours' ride from Lake Chautauqua. While at the camp they will have all the privileges of the Chautauqua assembly grounds.

Two or three trips may be had by each summer camper. One trip will be to New York city, another to Niagara Falls and Toronto, Can., and a third to Philadelphia and Boston. The camp will close on September 15. Return will be made by way of Washington, D. C.

Chaperone facilities for the summer camp will be adequate. Mrs. Coleman said. Mrs. Coleman will act as manager of the party. There will be a chaperon for every seven girls. Registration will begin at once.

Lake Chautauqua is one of the resorts most popular with Tulsans, a number of whom have private homes on the shore of the lake and at the assembly grounds.

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Employees and Employers Make Conflicting Claims of Cause.

"Open shop" was declared by all the electrical companies in Tulsa, Thursday, April 1, and as a result all the union electricians quit work. As one employer put it, "I declared open shop, and my men refused to work under an open shop policy, so I paid them off an hired non-union men."

Members of the electricians union declared that it was a lockout. They said that on April 1, they reported for work, and the shops were closed against union men. They say that an electrical company is to be organized in the next few days that will employ nothing but union men. At present there are no union electricians at work in the city. Employers say that it is because the men refuse to work under an open shop policy, and the employees say that it is because they have been locked out.
