Wood had only two candidates at large while Harding had four. The complete vote will be necessary to decide the winner. The last compilation showed Johnson ahead.

The victors seized arms, ammunition and bicycles belonging to the garrison and burned the barracks. Three policemen and one of the attacking party were wounded.

INSTRUCT FOR LOWDEN

Gets Delegate in Fifth Arkansas District; Friends Expected to Control State Convention Today. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 27.—Republicans of the First congressional district in convention at Wynne today, elected C. T. Bloodworth of Corning, delegate to the republican national convention and instructed him to vote for Governor Frank O. Lowden for president. He is the only one of the seven delegates thus far elected from this state to be instructed.

SOLD SANDWICHES TOO HIGH

Cafe Owners Are Indicted in Chattanooga; Milk Also "Too High." CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 27.—Federal indictments charging profiteering were returned today at the instance of the federal price commission against Gus and Peter Thompson, Peter Miltzberg and M. O. Thompson, cafe proprietors. The three first named are alleged to have sold "club" sandwiches at 26¢ a profit of more than 300, and the last named, a glass of milk at 15¢ a profit of 31¢, according to the indictments.

Poindexter Gets 11 Washington Delegates

BELLEVILLE, Wash., April 27.—The republican state convention, nipping in the bud an incipient fight over a recommendation of a national convention, today elected four delegates-at-large to the national convention, named 11 presidential electors and adopted a platform. The state delegation was instructed, in a resolution unanimously adopted, to "loyally use every means in their power" to secure the presidential nomination of Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington.

HOWARD AGAIN CANDIDATE

First District Congressman Files—Cham Jones Enters in Sixth. OKLAHOMA CITY, April 27.—Justice Frank M. Bailey of Tulsa, a member of the fifth judicial district filed application today to have his name placed on the ballot in the August primary as a candidate for re-election. E. B. Howard of Tulsa, representative in congress from the First district filed for re-election and Cham Jones of Waurika filed as a candidate for re-election in the sixth congressional district.

OLD GRUDGE IS SETTLED

Marshall Brooks Is Slain in Front of Bank at Hobart. By Associated Press Staff Writer. HOBART, Okla., April 27.—Marshall Brooks, a local merchant, was shot and killed in front of the bank at that place late yesterday as the result of what is said to have been an old grudge between himself and George Dodd, also of Hobart. Dodd is said to have fired three shots, two of which entered Brooks' neck and breast, and the wounded man died within a few minutes. An inquest has been ordered.

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
