

### FIGHT ON LABOR CONTROL ASKED

Speakers Urge Organized Effort by U. S. Commerce Chamber.

### ASK FOR RUSS TRADE

Resolutions Disclaim Recognition of Soviet but Want Business Connection.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 27.—The chamber of commerce here will devote its third session to the subject of labor control, when speakers urged the necessity of an organized effort to control the situation which has arisen since labor has assumed operation of the railways.

H. H. Angell, banker and lumberman, and acting mayor of Danbury, who precipitated the discussion of labor control, now is a member of the railroad committee and will speak on the subject.

He asserted he was not antagonistic to labor nor to workingmen, but he was opposed to anything like a dictatorship. Plans to be made to first paralyze the railways and then throw them into government control.

The chamber of commerce should make recommendations to both national conventions in favor of national banks against union labor domination. The party that will lead us to satisfaction is the party that will save us from this trouble.

The report of the committee appointed unanimously declared railroads are entitled to receive from shippers and passengers rates that will pay them a living wage for services performed, and it is the duty of the public to insist that its representatives in city councils, in the state legislatures and in the national congress shall establish by legal enactment a transportation policy that is sound from a business standpoint.

Greater respect for private property, in which since the war there has been an incalculable increase vital to the trade interests of the world, George K. Roberts, vice president of the National City bank of New York, said in an address.

### CASE GOES TO GRAND JURY

Branham and Gibbons Waive Hearing on Liquor Possession Charge.

John Branham and Harold Gibbons, charged with illegal possession of Jamaica Binger, waived preliminary hearing yesterday before C. L. Yarnes, United States commissioner, and were released on bonds of \$1,500 for action of the federal grand jury. Clara E. Howard, a woman who claims to be an agent of the Val-Jona-Jung company of Chicago, also arrested in connection with the seizure of \$2,400 worth of cigars, arrested at Red Fork two weeks ago, was released by the commissioner after promising to leave Oklahoma.

The woman claimed that as agent of the drug company she was instructed to come to Tulsa and take care of shipments billed to Red Fork. She claimed she did not know the nature of the contents of the boxes seized by federal officers, but later showed that the woman ordered large quantities of the liquor, procured from Red Fork to Oklahoma City.

The foreign commerce group tonight adopted resolutions offered by William C. Redford of New York, former secretary of commerce, that the trade embargo against Russia be lifted and relations between citizens of the United States and Russia be resumed. ### ADVISE DIRECTOR FOR RECREATION

Community Service Takes Stand for Systemized Playgrounds.

Engaging of a paid city recreation director was recommended at the meeting of the council of the Tulsa community service in the library Monday evening. A committee of five was appointed to select a suitable man or woman for the office, learn whether or not he or she would serve, and to devise ways and means for raising funds. A local individual was suggested for the post. The committee, which was instructed to report at the next meeting on Friday evening, May 7, is composed of Paul Blackwelder, chairman; Mrs. Arthur J. Craver, W. C. Rieger, Miss Lavelle Jacobs, and Carolyn Baker.

Protost actual selling of any of the park property of the city was also voted by the council. It was announced that N. G. Henthorn, new president of the park board, will serve on the council.

### REMODEL POSTOFFICE

Mail Handling Capacity of Office to Be Increased and Basement Used For Parcel Post Room.

Remodeling of the interior of the local post office will begin within a few days. V. L. Dougherty, representative of the King Lumber company of Charlottesville, Va., which procured the contract for the work on a bid of \$15,000, having arrived in the city and begun laying out plans for the improvements. Under the contract, the south lobby will be extended west 18 feet, becoming parcel post will be transferred to the basement, additional facilities provided for handling the mails, and the alley north of the post office building will be paved to allow greater speed in loading and unloading parcel post and parcel route mail wagons and trucks. The improvements are to be completed within three months from this time.

### TO OPEN NEW ADDITION

The present definite plans include the subdividing of this property into very large tracts inviting purchasers who wish to build homes of the more pretentious class. The lots will be restricted to from 10 to 50 thousand dollars and the restrictions will be of the type that will insure the home owner against the encroachment of any undesirable class of buildings.
