Miss Pyle Tells Members of Association Work of National Meet.

DELEGATES TO REPORT

Two New Secretaries Added to Force of Institution at Board Meeting.

The resignation of Miss Horner was recently accepted with great regret by the board of directors of the Tulsa association. Miss Horner has been a member of the secretarial staff for the past four and a half years and during that time has made a reputation for efficiency in girls work which has been recognized by the national headquarters and which is equaled only by a few other girls work secretaries in the country. Miss Horner is the daughter of J. T. Hor-

ner, head of the commercial department in the Tulsa high school, and Mrs. Horner, high school librarian. Her plans for the future have not yet been announced.

OPEN FORT SMITH ROAD

New Rail Line Will Receive Traffic on June 1 Announcement Says.

FORT SMITH, Ark., April 29.—The Fort Smith, Subian and Rock Island railway connecting with Fort Smith at Paris, via the Arkansas Central line and connecting at Dardanelle with the Rock Island railroad will be open to commercial traffic June 1, it was announced at the company's headquarters here today. The road is 40 miles long and opens a rich coal field, farming and timber country. The first train was sent over the road today.

Mayor J. Wade Bone received notice from Federal Prohibition Director John W. Reese today that all vendors and users of extracts are prohibited from selling any extract of syrup for beverage purposes containing more than one per cent alcohol. Hotels, cafes and drink stands selling extracts or syrups will be counted as having sold such liquids for beverage purposes, the order states. "Jake" may not be sold in quantities larger than two ounces, it is added.

GIFTS TOTAL SIX MILLION

Rockefeller Family Contributes to Funds Raised by Baptists.

NEW YORK, April 29.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., today made a gift of \$4,000,000 in the name of his mother, to the new world movement of northern Baptists. The oil magnate previously contributed a personal gift of \$2,000,000. The larger sum is given in the name of the Laura Spellman Rockefeller Memorial fund. The \$4,000,000 gift is half outright and half conditional. The first conditional million is credited to the movement when it reaches \$62,500,000, and the second when the fund totals \$17,500,000. The Baptists have raised \$27,500,000 to date for a survey of mission needs.
