REED CONTINUES FIGHT ON LEAGUE

Missourian Says He Is Still Opposed to Covenant as Framed. WILL SUPPORT TICKET Will Vote for Cox and Roosevelt, Notwithstanding Party Declaration, He Says.

TO STAY CLEAR OF EUROPE

Quotes Washington—Refuses to Recede From Position in Attack on Treaty. ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 14.—Reiterating his opposition to the covenant of the league of nations as it is now framed, and declaring that he will not recede one inch from the position he has previously taken, Senator James A. Reed, addressing a meeting here tonight, declared he intended to support the democratic candidates in the coming election, notwithstanding the declarations of the party in regard to the league of nations.

License of Tulsa Physician Revoked by Medical Board

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 14.—Dr. J. M. Lee of Tulsa late today was deprived of his license to practice by the state medical examining board. The board held that an advertisement by Lee was improper. Dr. Arthur Campbell of Tulsa, also charged with unprofessional advertising, was placed on probation by the board. The case of Dr. C. O. Hood, also of Tulsa, who faced a federal charge of dispensing narcotics, was continued until October. Lee's advertisement, held as "fake" by the board, is said to have appeared in a Tulsa newspaper last month, and claimed that an institute, with which Lee was connected, could accomplish certain cures by electricity. Lee has practiced in Oklahoma about 27 years, locating in Oklahoma City before statehood. Doctor Campbell, placed on probation, will retain his license. Doctor Hood, scheduled to appear before the board to be heard on the narcotic charges, filed a demurrer in his case, and the hearing was postponed until the next meeting of the board in October. SURRENDER DEMANDED

Anti-Government Forces Demand Mexican Border City Give Up—Federal Garrison Sleeping on Arms. LAREDO, July 14.—The federal garrison at Nuevo Laredo, the Mexican town opposite this city, was sleeping on arms tonight following receipt of a demand for its surrender to anti-government forces. The demand, according to Mexican Consul Saracho, was made by General Ricardo Gonzalez, who has several hundred disaffected soldiers and custom guards under his command. The demand, the consul said, met definite refusal on the part of Colonel Ortega, Mexican commander at Nuevo Laredo. Colonel Ortega declared he would defend the town to the end with the 200 loyal troops in the garrison. Saracho said he did not know the exact number of the federal forces, but that they included custom guards who revolted against the Carranza government at Nuevo Laredo government last May. These guards, he said, had been employed in the de la Huerta government, customs service up to a few days ago.

COX INVITED TO STATE

Den Lafayette Sends Request to Democratic Presidential Nominee. OKLAHOMA CITY, July 14.—The state democratic committee late today sent a telegram to Governor Cox, democratic presidential nominee, asking him to speak in Oklahoma. Ben M. Lafayette, state democratic chairman, said he considered it probable Governor Cox would accept the invitation as he intends to begin his campaign in the west. No reply has been received to the invitation sent the nominee by the state fair association.

Six Arkansas Negroes Reported Surrounded

FRIAR POINT, Miss., July 14.—Six escaped Arkansas negro convicts said to be well armed, are tonight believed to be surrounded in a wood near this place. Posses are on guard and will wait daybreak, it is said, before seeking to drive the negroes from their hiding places.

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CLAIMS SUGFRAGE CREDIT FOR G. O. P.

Harding "Resents Misrepresentation" of Party's Attitude. REPUBLICANS IN LEAD Only Seven Out of 35 States Ratifying Amendment Democratic. COMPLETES ADDRESS SOON Nominee Hopes to Have It Written Within Few Days for Notification. MARION, Ohio, July 14.—Senator Harding, in statement tonight, resented what he characterized as "persistent misrepresentation" of the republican party's attitude toward woman suffrage and said that that party belonged the credit for the reform over having a chance of success. He deplored, however, efforts to make political capital out of the situation, and said he hoped ratification would be accomplished before November no matter whether a democratic or republican state was the 36th to approve the suffrage amendment. "Even if a democratic state shall finish the business, the record will still show that 29 republican and seven democratic states made up the roll of honor," Senator Harding said. "That is good enough for us. Patience Tested. "My patience is sorely tested sometimes over the persistent misrepresentations of the republican party, its states, governors and legislatures on this matter of woman suffrage. Whether it emanates from mere mischief makers or from partisan desire, I cannot help resenting it. We must insist on having fair treatment of the party without whose reform never had a chance of success. "Six democratic states have rejected the ratification resolution and another, Louisiana, has just refused to give it consideration. One republican state—Miss. only—has rejected it. The first eight states to ratify were republican states. "When, in 1915, the republican senate finally mustered the necessary majority to submit the amendment, there were 35 republicans and only 20 democratic senators voting for it, but there were 17 democratic. Transfer Inmates From McAlester to Granite By Special Train. OKLAHOMA CITY, July 14.—Transfer of prisoners between the penitentiary at McAlester and the reformatory at Granite will begin tomorrow. The special train carrying prisoners from McAlester is scheduled to arrive at Oklahoma City at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning, according to an announcement by George E. Clark, chairman of the state board of public affairs, tonight. Return of the train from Granite to McAlester is expected Friday. The train tomorrow will stop here to receive a prisoner from the camp of convicts working on the capitol grounds.

Mrs. McCarter intimated "over 21" was sufficient in recording her age, but was informed by the clerk that a rule had been established this year that women must give their age or they cannot register.

SET UP QUARANTINE SOON

Federal Restrictions to Be Placed Against Cotton Shipments. WASHINGTON, July 14.—Establishment of a federal quarantine against interstate shipment of cotton from sections of Louisiana and Texas infected by the pink boll worm will be effected within a fortnight, it was announced today at a conference of cotton growers and state officials with the federal horticultural board. The convention then voted to drop all candidates except Malone and Christensen and proceeded with the voting on the second ballot. CHICAGO, July 14.—The "farmer-labor party" was the name chosen by the convention of the new political party here tonight. The new party, it was decided at the night session, will operate until August, 1921, under the labor party constitution. A draft of a new constitution was referred to a conference committee to be reported on next year. Robert LaFollette, Jr., notified new party leaders tonight that his father would not run under any circumstances on the platform adopted. The labor group dominated when the new fusion party adopted a platform late today in preparation for a nomination of candidates at tonight's session. A minority report from the platform committee was sponsored by three of the five representatives of the committee of 48, but was defeated by a vote of slightly less than 3 to 1. The majority report was sponsored by the five labor members of the committee on resolutions and two of the 48 party's representatives.
