

DEFER ACTION ON HEALTH MEASURE

Opposition Claims the Proposed Ordinance Is Too Drastic.

GIVEN TO COMMITTEE

New Ruling Would Require Physical Examination of Many Workers.

Action on the proposed ordinance to compel waitresses, waiters, cooks, butchers and others to submit to a physical examination before working at a position was deferred when the instrument was brought before the mayor and city commissioners yesterday morning.

The ordinance will react to its death, Youngman declared following the commission meeting. "Suppose a man's wife conducts a beauty parlor. She may be above reproach in character, and her morals unimpeachable. Yet she would be required to submit to a Washerman test. The ordinance would stir up a hornet's nest, and part of the stir might be justified. I believe it can be modified or changed in some manner so it will serve its purpose and yet be a little broader."

WANT TO CHANGE PAVING CONTRACT

Companies Come Before City Commission to Alter Details

Representatives of the Standard and Parker-Washington paving companies appeared before the city commission yesterday morning to ask if it will be possible to cancel their existing paving contracts insofar as specifications concerning base are concerned.

Specifications call for a 4-12 inch concrete base. Because of the extreme difficulty in obtaining a supply of cement, the paving companies desire to use an 8-inch bituminous base which they contend will stand as much traffic and be as durable as cement. They explained that concrete has a strength of 625 pounds to the square inch, while bituminous base has a strength of 850 pounds.

Two blocks of city paving, from Tenth to Twelfth on Main, were pointed out as examples of bituminous base. No action could be taken by the city, as the matter must be decided by property owners living in the districts affected by existing contracts. Representatives of the paving companies intimated they would take the matters up with property owners.

BAKER IS RELEASED ON BOND

Pleads Not Guilty to Violation of National Prohibition Law.

Jim Baker, charged with violation of the national prohibition law in connection with the raid on the home of Bud Nelson northeast of the city last Tuesday by county officers, entered a plea of not guilty at his arraignment yesterday before C. L. Yancey, United States commissioner, and was released on bond of \$1,500 for action by the federal grand jury.

McCowan Released on Bond

E. A. McCowan, arrested at Afton and returned to this city yesterday charged with moving a motor truck mortgaged to the Tulsa Boiler and Machine company out of the county, entered a plea of not guilty at his arraignment before Justice H. J. Gray. The defendant made a cash bond of \$300 for appearance at preliminary hearing August 5.
